MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT THE CLUBROOMS ON THURSDAY 9 NOVEMBER 2023 AT 8.00PM

1. PRESENT

3. MINUTES

In accordance with Item 9 of the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 23 February 2023, the minutes of that meeting were confirmed as a correct record of that meeting at a meeting of the General Committee held on 17 May 2023.

4. ANNUAL REPORT

4.1 The President, Mr Chapman, noted that, in order to continue the reduction of administrative expenses, the Annual Report and Financial Statements had not been published in hard copy. The President noted that the Annual Report and Financial Statements had not yet been published on the Club's website, but had been circulated by other electronic means to some members (mostly players).

4.2 The President tabled the electronic copy of the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the 2021/2022 season. In doing so, the President mentioned the following matters:-

4.2.1 The Club's achievements during the season and, because of the fact that the Annual Report and Financial Statements had not yet been published on the Club's website, several other matters recorded in more detail in the President's report in the Annual report.

4.2.2 The retiring committee members, namely Messrs P Henderson, G Dart, J Panelli and D Lovell and Ms C Ryan, and thanked them for their respective contributions.

4.2.3 The developments in obtaining funding for the redevelopment of the clubrooms, and thanked Mr G Dart, Ms I Redmond and Mr P McCusker for their work in securing this funding.

4.2.4 The work of Mr J Hill in researching and preparing the list of players, in chronological order of their debut ("cap numbers"), who have played A/1st Grade cricket for the Club, and thanked Mr Hill for all his work.

4.2.5 The success of the Brown Tie Dinner held in September 2023 and, in particular, the importance of the announcement of the Club's Team of the Century.

4.2.6 The end of his term as president, mentioning that he had valued his time as president and that he was looking forward to new challenges in working for the benefit of the club (including work with the Club's Vice-Presidents and past

players), and noted some of the highlights and challenges of his term as president.

- 4.3 Mr Henderson mentioned the following points regarding the Financial Statements:-
 - 4.3.1 The Club finished the financial year in much the same position as it had started the year.
 - 4.3.2 The fact that the Club won \$24,500.00 in prizemoney last season certainly assisted the final result.
- 4.4 It was proposed by the President that the Annual Report and the financial statements be adopted. Mr Greg Slack seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

5. SUBSCRIPTIONS

The President moved that the proposed subscriptions be adopted. The Treasurer seconded the motion.

The motion, that the subscriptions for the 2023/24 season be as noted above, was passed.

6. ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS

The President noted that the Club's constitution requires that the Committee of Management make recommendations for the nomination of those persons to be elected to the positions of Patron and Vice-Patron of the Club at the Annual General Meeting. The President reported that, at a meeting of the Committee of Management held on 6 September 2023, the Committee had recommended that Mr A J Woodcock be nominated for the position of Patron. The President further reported that, Mr H N Dansie having died on 23 May 2023 while still holding the office of Vice-Patron, the Committee of Management had recommended, at the

meeting of the Committee held on 6 September 2023, that Mr J T Hill be nominated for the position of Vice-Patron.

The motions for the election of Mr A J Woodcock as Patron of the Club, and Mr J T Hill as Vice-Patron of the Club, were moved by the President, and seconded by Mr Greg Slack.

The motions were passed.

The President reported to the meeting that there was one nomination for the position of President, namely a nomination from Mr T Bedford. The President therefore declared that Mr Bedford had been duly elected to the position of President, noting that this change would take effect at the conclusion of this Annual General Meeting.

The President noted that the Club's Constitution allows for the election of up to ten Vice-Presidents. During the Club's previous financial year, the Club had nine Vice-Presidents, namely Mr S D Alexander, Mr D Harford, Mr P R Henderson, Mr M Opie, Mr S D Parkinson, Ms I M Redmond, Mr Sean Rahaley, Mr A C Risby and Mr G B (Gary) Slack. The President reported that formal nominations for the position of Vice-President of the Club had been received from Messrs Henderson and Risby and from the President himself. The Committee of Management will use its power to fill casual vacancies, pursuant to the Club's Constitution, to deal with the appointment of additional Vice-Presidents.

7. ELECTION OF HONORARY AUDITOR

The President moved that Mr R Florence be appointed Auditor of the Club for the 2023/24 financial year. The Treasurer seconded the motion. In moving the motion, the President reported that Mr Florence had indicated his willingness to be appointed.

The motion was passed.

8. NOMINATION OF LIFE MEMBERS

8.1 The President nominated Mr Ashley Woodcock for election as a life member of the Club. In doing so, the President spoke of the following matters:-

- Ashley's history with the Club, having first started playing for the Club in junior teams;

- Ashley's achievements while playing for the Club and for other clubs;
- Ashley's achievements in first class cricket, including playing for Australia;
- Ashley's captaincy of the Club and of the South Australian team; and
- Ashley's involvement with the Club in recent years.

The motion was seconded by Mr Risby.

The President noted that the Club's Committee of Management had strongly endorsed this motion.

The motion was passed unanimously.

8.2 Mr Woodcock spoke in reply, and mentioned the following matters:-

- his early involvement with the Club, at a time when the Club's home ground was Kensington Oval;
- the fact that, at the time when he started, Sir Donald Bradman and Mr Clarrie Grimmett were still around the Club, and the fact that their presence whetted his appetite to play for the Club;
- his playing and coaching career;
- the fact that he had lost contact with the Club while working in USA and interstate, but that he was very pleased to be back with the Club; and
- his election as a life member was a great honour for him.

8.3 The Treasurer nominated Mr Nick Moschetta for election as a life member of the Club. In doing so, the Treasurer spoke of the following matters:-

- Nick's involvement with the Club as a player; and
- the value of Nick's involvement as a scorer and team manager, and particularly his position as practice captain.

The motion was seconded by Mr Simon Schwerdt. In doing so, Mr Schwerdt spoke of the following matters:-

- there is no greater honour than being a life member of the Club, and his great pleasure to be able to second the motion;
- Nick is a very quiet, self-effacing person, but Nick has been crucial to the ethos of the Club; and
- Nick has been of great value to the 2nd Grade team.

The President noted that the Club's Committee of Management had strongly endorsed this motion.

The motion was passed unanimously.

8.4 Mr Moschetta spoke in reply, and mentioned the following matters:-

- he is better with numbers than giving a speech;
- he thanked the Treasurer for the content of his nomination speech;
- he thanked Mr Schwerdt for the content of his speech, noting that Mr Schwerdt was also a great mentor;
- his Italian background was such that cricket was not originally part of his life, but that he had loved his involvement with the game and with the Club, having been made to feel very welcome when he came to the Club;
- he left the Club for a period of 33 years, but the Club had not changed in the intervening time;

- he has been passionately involved in his off-field activities for the Club, because some else did those jobs while he was playing and he felt that he should give back in whatever way he could; and
- he thanked all those who had made him welcome at the Club, and he thanked all members who supported his election a life member.

8.5 Ms Sarah Lowe nominated Ms Alice Johnswood for election as a life member of the Club. In doing so, Ms Lowe spoke of the following matters:-

- Alice was the architect of the successful women's cricket program which the Club has today;
- Alice's playing career;
- the dedicated service which Alice had given a manager of the men's 1st Grade team; and
- Alice's contribution as a member of the Club's Committee of Management.

The motion was seconded by Ms Jane Lowe. In doing so, Ms Lowe spoke of the following matters:-

- she endorsed Sarah Lowe's comments; and
- she particularly emphasised Alice's role in the establishment of the women's cricket program at the Club.

The President noted that the Club's Committee of Management had strongly endorsed this motion.

The motion was passed unanimously.

8.6 Ms Johnswood spoke in reply, and mentioned the following matters:-

- she was very honoured to be elected as a life member of the Club;
- the Club means much to her, and is a special place for her;
- she thanked her family, all of whom had supported her and the Club by volunteering for tasks at the Club;
- she has enjoyed seeing players progress through their careers and seeing the success of the women's program at the Club.

9. GENERAL BUSINESS

9.1 The President moved that the Club's Committee of Management be constituted a sub-committee of the Annual General Meeting for the purpose of resolving that the minutes of this Annual General Meeting be confirmed as a true and correct record of the meeting. Mr Schramm seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

9.2 The President presented Mr Russell Thompson with a 2022/23 1st Grade premiership medal, which the President had obtained from SACA, to replace the medal which Mr Thompson had originally received. The president explained that Mr Thompson generously given his medal to a player who had played 1st Grade matches during the season but who was not chosen in the grand final team, as a result of which he had not been presented with a medal at the grand final.

10. MEETING CLOSURE

There being no further business, the President closed the meeting at 9.15pm.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Season Summary

A significant change of personnel at committee level was the first noteworthy item for season 2023/24, with Graham Dart, David Lovell, Grant Chapman, Peter Henderson and Jamie Panelli all standing down. I would like to thank every one of the team for their outstanding contribution and service to the Club. The Kensington committee welcomed Richard Kelly, Michael Sullivan, David Eckert, Darren Matthews and Ben Johnswood to their ranks, and I thank you for your huge contribution to the running of the Club last season. We also had a couple of committee position changes with me taking up the position of President and David Burgess taking the role of Treasurer.

In terms of our cricket achievements and details, I'll leave that task in this report to our respective heads of men's, women's and junior cricket, but would like to acknowledge the following significant achievements for season 2023/24:-

- Women's 1st Grade 50 over grand final winners
- Women's 2nd Grade T20 grand final winners
- Women's C Grade (ATCA) grand finalists
- Women's U18 Youth Premier League grand final winners
- Men's Over 50s Division 2 grand final winners
- Men's 2nd Grade grand finalists
- Boys' U14 White grand final winners
- Boys' Ray Sutton Shield grand finalist
- Individual Honours

Congratulations to all of those involved in the teams above.

The focus of this year's annual report and annual general meeting will be around our Club finances, as it's a significant challenge that the Club faces and worthy of discussion with our members and those interested in the Club. Simply, there is reason for a level of considered concern and requires all of us to understand and focus our efforts on rectifying the position we seem to find ourselves in.

You may have noticed, from the last annual report, that our small loss for season 2022/23 of about \$1,000.00 was, in reality, due mainly to our men's 1st Grade team winning the two day and One Day Cup competitions and our women's 1st Grade team winning the 50 over competition. In all, prize money contributed \$24,500.00 to our bottom line, so our loss for the season was effectively more than \$25,000.00.

You will see, from the operating cost for 2023/24, that the finances are not much better, even though our women's 1st Grade team won \$10,000.00 for their grand final win. The signs are there and cannot be ignored any longer. The committee identified the red flag areas, and they are there for all to see. This is not a sustainable position and a significant threat to the Club, a position that the entire Club must collectively react to.

Our costs have increased significantly, and we've not managed those costs particularly well. Increased coaching costs, increased participation in ATCA competitions, additional junior matches, not recovering costs for non-Premier Cricket, unpaid sponsorship, bar losses and a failure to recover our general overheads have all contributed to the red bottom line. So, understanding our costs has been our primary focus over the last twelve months.

The good news is that we now fully understand our costs. We now understand each cost area of the Club and have developed budgets for each of those areas. We understand the costs for each

competition we enter and have considered those costs in our registrations and fees. We understand the minimum income we need to generate from sponsorship and donations and will now plan additional commercial opportunities to increase that income. Going forward, we will manage our Club within the financial parameters set by our income and focus our spend on Premier Cricket. In time, it is our aim to significantly increase our commercial income and reduce our playing fees.

Right, I think that's clear, so let's move on to other areas of the Club that need attention and which the committee and others have worked hard on from the start of last season. All of these activities are interlinked and collectively require our focus, as they are crucial to us pulling the Club forward in the short and medium term. Focusing in these areas will enable us to lay strong foundations in order for the Club to flourish in a semi-professional environment for the next 100 years.

But it is not all doom and gloom. We are the best placed club in the SACA, we have the best grounds and soon will be in new clubrooms that, in themselves, present us with enormous opportunity. We're smack bang in the middle of the eastern suburbs with a player and member base second to none. We are surrounded by a huge number of potential supporters and sponsors, and all we have to do is structure our management of the Club to maximise the benefit of all of the above.

That's what the next few years will be about.....

I'll now go into the focus areas we've worked on during last season and throughout the close season.

Club position and forward planning

With a new president and significant changes on the committee, changes have been made to the ongoing management of the Club and our focus on our short and medium-term objectives. As I mentioned in my open communication to the entire Club in November, Kensington DCC faces a number of challenges going forward, not least the growing cost burden of our activities and the efficient planning of our way through a minefield of compliance and legislative requirements, at the same time ensuring that our cricket programs are suitably managed, resourced, funded and planned.

All of this effort requires active management and is fundamental to us successfully operating a semi-professional sports club and our high-performance personnel. We need to ensure that we structure and plan our costs and activities efficiently and effectively, ensuring our cricket and club operations are aligned to delivering success. To this end we have drafted a formal Club strategic plan (CSP) which will be finalised and rolled out across the Club during season 2024/25.

So, what have we done so far and what are we planning? What have we planned and achieved during season 2023/24 and during the close season?

Our forward planning requires key critical input and actions in the following areas:-

1. ***A formal Strategic Plan*** – This ensures that we agree on a mission statement for the Club that aligns us to an agreed direction. It identifies the forward needs of the Club in order to focus on our agreed direction. It identifies our costs, budgets, income and grant opportunities. It identifies the threats and opportunities presenting themselves to the Club and how they will be managed and allows us to identify our strengths and weaknesses so we can effectively manage and mitigate the impact of those weaknesses accordingly.
2. ***Cricket*** - A refocus on our Premier Cricket activities across the entire Club and embedded within our strategic plan. We will ensure that we target our Club resources, effort and planning to maintain our Division 1 status in the men's two day competition, and enable us to consistently challenge for honours across men's, women's and junior cricket in all formats. To enable this, we consulted with each area of our cricket and assessed, with each of the heads of men's, women's and junior cricket, what's needed to ensure we provided the best and most sustainable programs:-
 - increases in coaching budgets and to ensure the necessary coaching structures in place
 - formal coaching contracts in place across the Club

- a plan for player recruitment and retention being developed
 - a playing, selection and development policy that sets out how we approach our high-performance cricket and pathway opportunities.
3. **Communications** - Almost everything that we do in the Club requires effective communication, but to date we've not had a consistent platform to communicate with all of our members. Therefore, we have engaged with a service provider and created a membership platform that covers the entire Club. Past players, committee, life members, players, parents, vice-presidents - the database covers them all, and we can selectively target specific categories of members and communicate to individual groups or reach our entire membership at the click of a button.

Many of you would have received a text message seeking your email address. This is due to us pulling together a number of Club 'databases' and filling in the email gaps. The database will be ready for the start of the season and regular, planned communications will come from me, the committee and other Kensington members.

We are also looking at our social media communications platforms and having a clear policy on content, media releases and responsibilities. Needless to say, we will require a number of volunteers to assist going forward and a sub-committee reporting back to the club committee.

4. **Marketing and Sponsorship** - We've focused heavily on our marketing during the close season and have produced some key marketing data and brand publication information for the Club. We'll use this marketing publication to attract key sponsors and build our membership base. Marketing and sponsorship rely heavily on our ability to communicate with our members and to have regular communications that promote our sponsors' brands. This is a huge growth area of the Club as it's clear that, as brand Kensington, we have historically under-sold ourselves, so there is clear financial opportunity here.
5. **Club funding and Finances** - Our Club cannot function without funding. We now have a full understanding of exactly where our income comes from and where it goes. This may sound logical, but we need to grow our income and will look at various income streams to fund our Premier Cricket programs to the highest possible levels and sustain these efforts into the future.
6. **Volunteers** - As important as, if not more important than, Club funding and finance is our volunteer base. We cannot operate without volunteers, but we also have to structure our Club in order to get the maximum benefit from those wonderful people who are willing to put their hands up to help. We are in need of a number of key and new positions to enable our Club to function effectively. We need sub-committees for every area of the Club to lighten the load on many who work tirelessly to help the Club run. Please reach out personally if you believe you can assist.
7. **New Clubrooms** - Most of you will now know that the new clubrooms are now fully funded. Therefore, the Club is actively forward-planning our operations through the build phase to ensure our cricket is unaffected. We are also looking at the various options available to us for our operation of the new clubrooms once they are handed over. The new clubrooms offer a significant opportunity which will be actively pursued.

Season 2024-25

All of the work that has been done last season lays the foundation for the next season and so on. Next year we will build on the work done last year, and we'll continue to evolve and grow. Our new clubrooms should be well on the way and our planning to prosper from their construction will be firmed up and being rolled out.

We know that the areas we've tackled during the off season will be further defined, but there are some clear areas to focus on next season:-

1. **Kensington Vice-Presidents** - Our Vice-Presidents form a crucial forum that traditionally and actively manages past players, functions, lunches and the coordination of many major fund-

raising activities to benefit the Club. We currently have a number of vacancies in our Vice-Presidents' group, and we will be actively recruiting so that we maintain a focused and engaged Vice-Presidents' group going forward. I'm very much looking forward to working closely with all the Vice-Presidents for the benefit of the Club.

2. **Bar Management and Operation** – A focus on how best to operate and resource our bar. What stock to hold and what pricing is appropriate. We are also in discussions with Burnside Rugby Club on how best to operate a single facility.
3. **Our facilities** – The use of our ovals, the clubrooms and our wickets is now managed in one place by facilities coordinator Richard Kelly. Access to the clubrooms, and the use of the facilities by third parties, will now be via Richard. We are developing rates and a strategy to commercialise our ovals and clubrooms whilst ensuring that we do not over-use our wickets.
4. **Grounds** – We're due to replace our squares on Parkinson and Col. Waite Ovals, and we may have to look into our ground maintenance activities that would enable us to produce a better outfield on Parkinson Oval. We'll also be looking at a Club policy on who plays where, in order to minimise unnecessary wear and tear and to reserve Parkinson Oval for Premier Cricket and finals only.
5. **Club Constitution** – The committee is reviewing the Club's constitution and will be seeking the Club to endorse an update that reflects the way in which we want to manage the Club going forward.
6. **Club Governance and Delegation of Authorities** – This is more of a general tightening of the way we operate, and will tie into the updated constitution, but we do need to be clear as to who can approve what, where the responsibilities lie and our own reporting requirements.
7. **Social Program** – I think we'll all agree that we've not benefited from an active social program at the Club, and this is an area we would like to focus on, but it needs a social coordinator and a number of people to assist via a sub-committee. A significant area of growth is with our past players and to ensure we are able to effectively manage our past player contacts.
8. **Marketing** - To further develop our Kensington brand, allowing us to effectively market the Club and to target key partnering and sponsorship opportunities both domestically and overseas.
9. **Overseas Opportunities** – To develop existing and new ties with clubs in the UK and Ireland that allow us to benefit from overseas players while also providing reciprocal opportunities for our own players, both established and developing.

All in all, the Club, its fabulous culture, its members and outlook look very solid indeed. The only real blemish is our financial standing which has caused some concern. But our efforts to understand those finances, and our willingness to work tirelessly to rectify the position we've found ourselves in, is good news. This, paired with our clear unrealised commercial opportunities in the eastern suburbs, bodes well for the Club and its future, and I look forward to driving our improvements for the coming years.

The pathway works to identify and filter those who want to be cricketers of the highest level, not just talent, but a commitment to identifying talent.

Nick Moschetta always deserves a special mention for his work during the week at trainings and guiding our players and coaches efficiently.

Mark Firth was a stand-out volunteer for us this season; he had an invaluable impact on all the teams that he interacted with. The 1st Grade men each weekend, the men's 2nd Grade finals teams, the women on a Wednesday, and Sundays with the Over 50s. Positive and fun, Firthy did a great job and supported every Brown the same. He is a great addition, whom we hope to have for years to come.

Gary Wright is a long serving batting coach but stepped up this season to co-ordinate selection dinners. It was just another role that Gary has facilitated in his own special way, and it is one of those 1% efforts that need to be done.

In regard to cricket, the 2023/24 season was a challenge!

It started with a farewell to Elliot Opie. Our men's 2nd Grade side continued to find ways to win games and is a credit to the culture that has been developed in the past and to the work the leaders of that team provided. Will Rice and Tom Mackenzie led the team well, progressing to the grand final, but unfortunately a session of cricket for the season let them down.

The men's 3rd Grade side was unfortunate to miss out on finals, and a permit issue was probably the difference. It is in the end why we love this game; it isn't easy and, if you get ahead of yourself or take short cuts, it will find you out.

Once again, I thank the Club for the opportunity to be the Kensington coach. It is a great club, has great people and players, and it has great expectations for where it wants to be in the future.

The 2023/24 season was one of great change for the 4th Grade team. Instead of all games being red ball, there was the exciting introduction of white ball and coloured kit. There were two new captains and a whole host of new faces in the team, including several juniors making their senior debuts. The 4th Grade won the premierships in 2022/23 and, even with all the changes, the aim for the 2023/24 season was to defend our title.

The first three rounds of the season were coloured-kit one day games and the new look team got off to a great start by winning the first two games. The highlight was a Harrison Rahaley 117, which saw us chase down an imposing total of 222 off our 40 overs against Sturt. It was also great to see juniors Henry Briggs, Arnav Choudhary and Lachie Van Gerven make their senior debut for the Browns. All three showed promise that they can succeed at this level and higher, as well as giving performances which contributed to vital wins throughout the season.

Round 4 saw the first red ball two day game of the season and ended up being one of the highlights of the season. An extremely hard-fought game went right down to the wire, resulting in an 11 run win for Kensington. An exceptional 111 from Jim Kelly was the backbone of a first innings score of 237, which was very competitive but by no means match-winning. The team fought all the way to the end, and bowled exceptionally throughout the Woodville innings, to ensure they never got away from us. The game was won by an inspiring spell from Nick Holmes, who took the final three wickets in quick succession to finish with 5/68. This was a hallmark performance and was underpinned by what it is to be a Brown.

Rounds 5 and 6 went back to one day games, and we had two very comfortable victories which demonstrated how strong we were as premiership contenders. In the game against Port Adelaide, Nathan Woods starred with 119no to see us chase down 177 with the loss of only one wicket. It was against Port that Taite Brook made his senior debut, and he looked right at home straight away with three catches and a well compiled 33no in support of Woods. Round 6 against Southern was a pretty similar story; good tight bowling from all the bowlers restricted them to 6/170, and then 50s from Chapman and Woods saw us reach their total with eight overs remaining for the loss of only two wickets. This was the last game before Christmas, and we would not play again until Round 9 due to all our byes being in consecutive weeks. Unfortunately, this was the last we would see of our captain Hamish Porter, as he would be moving to Sydney. Another hallmark performance was that, as a fielding side, we never gave up and the bowlers were rewarded for consistently bowling in good areas. A more comfortable win followed in Round 10, with our batting unit firing to amass 276 against East Torrens, the highlight being Jim Kelly's 88no. On the second day, we bowled East Torrens out for 201, with Mitchell George being the destroyer-in-chief, picking up 4/33. Once again this game saw another senior debut, with Abraham Peter making his first senior appearance and bowling with good pace. Round 11 saw a slight blip with a disappointing loss against Northern Districts. However, we did see very promising senior debuts from Hayden Kamencak and Declan Bell, with the former bowling exceptionally well to take four wickets on debut. Round 12 saw a demolition of Prospect. Once again the batting unit fully fired - a 50 from Jim Kelly and then 80s from Nathan Woods and Daniel Subramanian saw us reach 318. We closed off the regular season with an underwhelming loss against Adelaide University, unable to chase down 212 from our 40 overs. This meant that we finished fourth in the table and qualified for finals. We would play against University again, looking to avenge the loss in Round 13. It should be noted that reaching finals with such a young, inexperienced and ever-changing side was a huge achievement in itself, so everyone who played for the 4th Grade this year and contributed should be extremely proud of themselves.

Our semi-final against University was away and, after a sloppy start which allowed them to get to 0/50, we fought back extremely well. REPORT FROM CO-ORDINATOR OF WOMEN'S CRICKET

Looking back on the past season, our women's programme can be proud of what was achieved, both on and off the field. Having said that, there are still areas that we can look to improve on in coming seasons, and some where we perhaps fell short, but on balance we can be happy with season 2023/24.

On the field, all teams achieved the ultimate success with finals appearances, and victories, a truly impressive performance. As well as the ultimate team success, a number of our players were successful in achieving personal recognition, through both representative selection, and individual awards. These performances, across all levels, bode well for the future of the Club and our playing group. Others will detail these results in more detail, but a quick overview is as follows:-

- Our 1st Grade won the One Day final in a nail-biter that showed the true character of this playing group. Sadly, they missed the T20 final, finishing third.
- Our 2nd Grade were awarded the T20 premiership, in a washed-out final series, having finished top of the ladder. The team came third in the One Day competition, losing their semi-final.
- Our U18 team reached the grand final, having gone through their preliminary matches undefeated, and scored a convincing win in the grand final.
- Our 3rd Grade, playing in the ATCA Division 2 competition, made it through to the grand final, finishing as runners-up.
- As the top performing SACA club across 1st and 2nd Grade One Day Competitions, we were awarded the prestigious President's Trophy.

The above results reflect the depth of our current playing group - reward for the hard work put in by so many over the years in developing and growing our playing group.

We were fortunate to welcome several new players to the Club this season who filled important roles in our 1st Grade team. This decline in numbers also made it difficult for us to field a team, under the Payneham banner, in the Strikers Girls Cricket League competition on Friday nights, as we had previously done. This was disappointing, both in not being able to provide a team playing and learning opportunity for our Academy group, and also being pivotal in ending what had been a most successful relationship with Payneham for many seasons. We hope to rebuild the Academy numbers in season 2024/25.

Again, we had a number of important volunteers who assisted across the season. There was a number of parents who regularly helped out with the 2nd and 3rd Grade teams, both scoring and umpiring, so a big thank you to all of them. Our teams wouldn't be able to participate without your help.

Notable contributors included the following:-

- Andrew Rumbelow as batting/assistant coach for the 1st Grade team. Rumbles also continued as the team's good luck charm. He is yet to lose a game when filling the role of game day coach in Jamie Panelli's absence – long may that continue!
- John Palmer Senior as practice manager - a great aid to our coaches and players in keeping them on task and ensuring that trainings run smoothly.
- Alex Smith as scorer for the 1st Grade team this season.
- Tracy Juers continued in her role as 2nd Grade manager, and Georgia Lloyd stepped up as 3rd Grade manager.

As well as attending games, Amy was at every training session, and also provided statistical analysis which was invaluable for both coaches and players. In recognition of her efforts, Amy was awarded SACA's Fellows Award, recognising the Most Valuable Contribution by a Volunteer in the women's cricket space.

As previously mentioned, Darren Bain joined our coaching team, looking after the ATCA side on Sundays and assisting on Wednesday nights.

Nick Holmes again looked after the 2nd Grade team, and together with Eliza Doddridge supported the U18 team. The U18 role was complementary to both Nick's and Eliza's roles with our young players - Nick with our young 2nd Grade group, and Eliza with the Academy.

For assisting with the Academy, and mentoring our young players, Ruby Smith and Ayisha Salah were jointly awarded the Club's Most Valuable Player Award.

As our 1st Grade coach, much of the success of our women's programme can be attributed to Jamie Panelli. 1st Grade coach in name, Jamie is much, much more than that. The hours and hours he puts into our group is invaluable. He instils in all of our players strong values both on and off the field, challenging them all not only to be better players, but better people. We are most fortunate to have him lead our group.

We continue to have strong support from the Club, and for this we thank our President, Tony Bedford, and all of the committee.

Our women's playing group can reflect favourably on season 2023/24, and look forward to season 2024/25 with positivity, building on our strong and solid foundations.

SENIOR COACH'S REPORT

These 'Brown Girls' are incredible group of athletes. I sit here writing the report for 2024, and I see myself scribing the same words as before; they haven't just stamped themselves as a great team now, they are one of the greatest our Club and competition has seen.

If you read last season's report, you would likely, and understandably, feel it was a duplicate for this season. The fact is we did prepare and play very similarly. We feel there is richness to our training and game plan that is effective for our squad and program.

Our players are proud to play for Kensington and are the hardest working in the competition. Unfortunately, the training, the effort and previous back-to-back premierships we won over the last two seasons, don't guarantee another premiership, but, as I mentioned in previous years, our measure of success is only part on silverware and majority on our females enjoying their environment, building a thriving high-performance program and being the best version of themselves through cricket and our club culture.

This season, in collaboration with the players, we once again put some pillars of performance together. This time, the players settled on their four focus areas that meant the most out of all them.

Our four Performance Pillars are:-

- **D.N.A. – 'Our Belief' Driving Never-Fail Attitudes. We haven't failed if we haven't finished. This is in our DNA.**
- **Power of 2 – 'Our Strength' Partnerships are powerful. Code of Togetherness.**

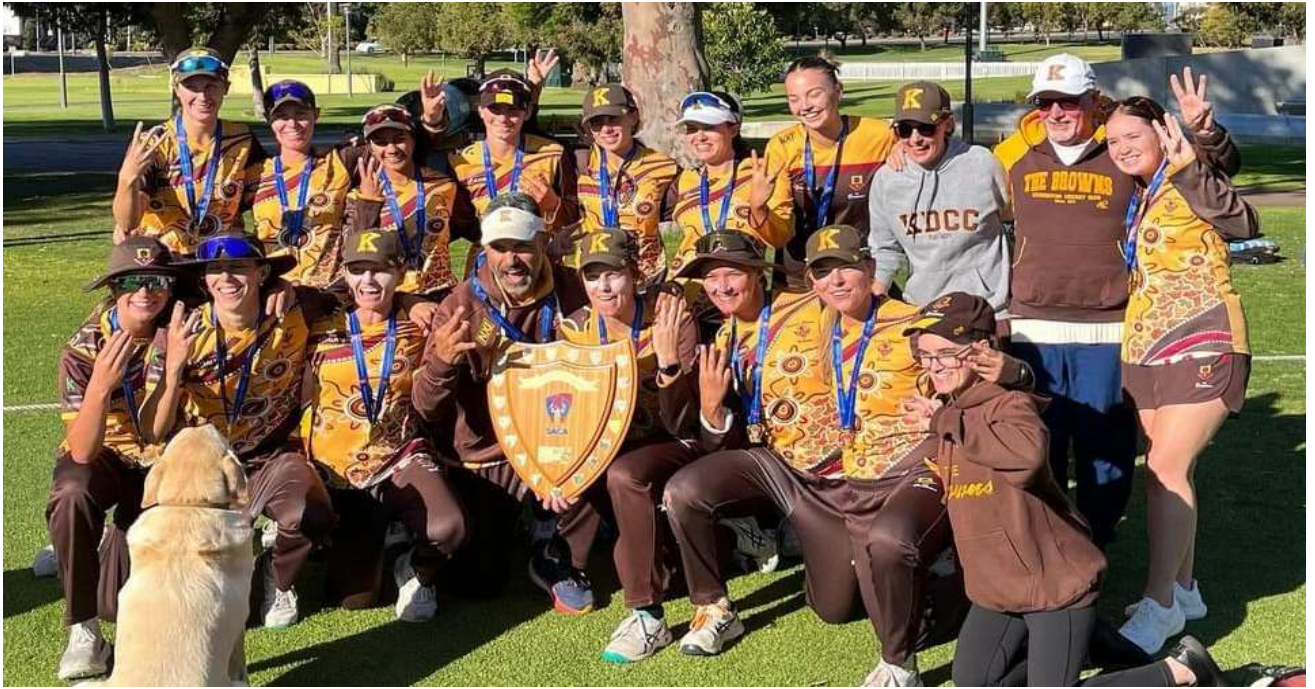

- 7/132 - 10 runs to get, and their set batter is 64 not out.
- Em Filsell has done her driver and came off, strapped it up and waited patiently on the side lines. I asked her "are you going to bowl again", she looked me fair and square in the eye and said "Yes, I am". "I am going until I can't walk!!!!"

Enter Em Filsell!!! Clean bowls their set batter on 64, and it's game on. Three wickets and 10 runs to get. Iggy Bansal bowls a maiden over in the 49th, and they have one wicket in hand and need three runs from the last over.

Our skipper comes back to bowl the last and ultimate over; she needs only three balls and seals the deal and the THREE PEAT!

Sarah took responsibility to lead this team to the very end and, as usual, took responsibility to finish the game when it was needed.

To her credit, she hasn't bowled enough and she has made sure the others got their bowling.

It came down to the last over and she stood up as she has done so many times before. Three in a row secured!

No Kensington 1st Grade side has ever won three in a row - this is a record for our Club.

Only one other side in the history of SACA Premier Cricket has won three in a row in the women's A/1st Grade competition, and that was Port Adelaide two decades ago. The competition is far different now, and Port Adelaide are not in the SACA women's competition any more.

We have now won five One Day flags and four T20 premierships in our short history.

Seven grand finals out of the last 10 for the 50 over competition. Outstanding work ladies!

The most emotional and vulnerable moments as players (and coaches) are sometimes those after the immediate end of a season. Once again, the sharing and language when each of our players spoke was truly a reflection of their investment and love for their team and club. I well up every time I think about these last three seasons' exchanges in the changerooms. These players have something special and a bond that is far more than a few premiership moments.

The Kensington women's 2nd Grade side, also known as the B Grade, had another great year packed with individual and team success. This year, SACA reduced the T20 fixtures to play more one day cricket. We went undefeated in our five T20 games, with one round washed out. Sadly, the semi-final and the grand final were also washed out. Since we were top of the ladder at the end of the minor round, we were awarded the premiership, making us back-to-back premiers. Stand-out T20 performances were Lucy (40no) and Eliza (43no) in Round 1, Chloe (3/8) and Teju (47) in Round 4, and Mon (4/5) in Round 5.

The team saw a few changes during the one day competition, with the most notable one being the appointment of Shannon Calvert as captain. Shannon did a fantastic job stepping into the role, and her kindness and leadership were appreciated by all the players.

Only the top three teams in this competition go through to finals, and so getting into this was a clear goal for our girls and new captain Shannon. Towards the end of the season, we were in fourth place and needed to push ourselves to get to third. The team had an absolute nail-biter against the then third-placed West Torrens, which we won with one over to spare. Ruby Smith's 41 and Sahara's 25 steadied the ship before Chloe hit two fours to finish the game. REPORT FROM CO-ORDINATOR OF JUNIOR BOYS' CRICKET

Well done to all players on a very successful and enjoyable 2023/24 cricket season.

Our SACA Premier Cricket junior teams all performed strongly:-

- the U18s made the semi-finals
- the U17s finished third
- the U16 Reds finished fifth
- the U16 Whites made the semi-finals
- the U14 Reds finished fifth
- the U14 Whites won the premiership
- the Ray Sutton Shield team made the grand final.

A number of our junior players made the transition to senior cricket and acquitted themselves well. We always try to challenge our most talented players whenever the opportunity presents and performances demand. At times we saw U14 players jump up and represent our U16s, and some Academy players were promoted to U14 level. It is heartening to see young players seize these opportunities rather than shy away.

Many of these players are now coaching our junior teams. Circle of life!

Coaching

It is a strength of the Club that our senior cricketers are so willing to support the junior program. It highlights the "One Club" philosophy of Kensington, and it is amazing how quickly junior players can end up playing alongside their coaches in senior ranks!

Junior cricket is not necessarily about winning... but it is fun when you do! Premierhips do not come along very often. Congratulations to our U14 White team, who won a flag this season.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In my secretary's report included in last year's annual report, I set out the background leading to the decision to implement the model of two divisions in the Premier Cricket men's 1st Grade competition in the 2023/24 season. As I mentioned in that report, the SACA Board of Management determined that the eight clubs, whose teams would participate in the new Division 1 in the 2023/24 season, would be those clubs whose teams occupied the first eight positions on the 1st Grade premiership table at the end of the 2022/23 minor round. These eight clubs were (in premiership table order) Kensington, Port Adelaide, Adelaide University, West Torrens, Glenelg, Tea Tree Gully, East Torrens and Woodville. This left (again in premiership table order) Sturt, Northern Districts, Prospect, Adelaide and Southern District (with the SACA U19 team) to form Division 2.

One of the matters, which accompanied the introduction of the two-division system, was the requirement for the Premier Cricket Committee (PCC) to implement a model for promotion and relegation between the two divisions. In the event, the PCC decided that the teams finishing 7th and 8th at the end of the minor round would be relegated to Division 2, and that (subject to one restriction) the teams finishing 1st and 2nd in Division 2 would be promoted to Division 1, for the following season. The one restriction on promotion was that, pursuant to a direction given by the Board of Management when the two-division system was introduced, the SACA U19 team would not be eligible for promotion, irrespective of where it finished on the premiership table. This restriction will also apply in future seasons.

As can be imagined, the introduction of the two-division system raised a number of questions for determination by the PCC. One such matter concerned the award of the Bradman Medal – should the award of the Bradman Medal be based on umpires' votes in matches in both divisions, or should the award of the Bradman Medal be based only on votes from matches in Division 1? After consideration, the PCC decided that the award of the Bradman Medal should be based only on votes from matches in Division 1, and that a separate award be introduced for matches in Division 2. This resulted in a decision to name the new medal, to be presented to the best player in Division 2, after Andrew Sincock. As many would know, Andrew (whose playing career started as a junior with our Club) had a long and distinguished playing and coaching career at both club and State level in South Australia and was a valued member of the SACA Board of Management for many years.

As I have noted earlier in my report, the SACA U19 team participated in Division 2 this season. In the early stages of discussions about the two-division system, some clubs (including Kensington) suggested that there should be a limit of two players per club for players selected to play for the U19 team in any match. This suggestion was rejected by SACA. As a result, some clubs (including Kensington) often had more than two of their players playing for the U19 team in a particular match, while other clubs had no players selected for the U19 team for the whole season. Clubs were recompensed by SACA for the selection of their players for the U19 team – the compensation was \$500.00 per player selected per match, payable at the end of the season. Three Kensington players played in the U19 team in each of six of the U19's matches (there were ten minor round matches), while two Kensington players played in each of three minor round matches. Jack Matchett, who had the honour of being selected as captain of the U19s, was the only Kensington player who played for the U19s in all ten minor round matches. Kyle Adams, Tom Menzies, Ryan Percival and Seb McVann were the other Kensington players who played for the U19s. As a result, Kensington received \$12,500.00 in compensation for the loss of its players. While that amount may appear to be a worthwhile benefit (in terms of Club revenue for the season), it does nothing to ameliorate the immediate loss of those players from Kensington teams. This loss affects not only the Kensington team (1st or 2nd Grade) for which the player would have been selected if available, but also consequential selections in every other Kensington team.

Given that 2023/24 season was the first season involving the threat of relegation and the promise of promotion between the men's 1st Grade divisions, the season was again a most significant one for all clubs. In our case, we were naturally hoping for the ultimate success of a premiership, but perhaps more realistically hoping to finish in the top six teams in the 1st Division. Our hopes were tempered by the loss of Jake Brown (to retirement) and Alex Ross (to Sydney to further his career)

at the end of last season, and by the retirement of Elliot Opie early this season. No club can hope to cover immediately the loss of three great players who have contributed so much, over so long, to the success of the 1st Grade team. One could argue that the Club only just managed to survive in Division 1 (in sixth place by a margin of only five points above East Torrens), but that view perhaps does not do sufficient justice to our team – had the team won just one more match on the first innings, it could have finished in fourth place, and we played both Glenelg and West Torrens (the teams which finished the minor round in first and second place respectively) twice. Also, as mentioned above, we lost players to the SACA U19 team. In my view, it is a credit to all those who played in our 1st Grade team this year that the Club will play in the 1st Division next season.

Although the Club's season was not as successful as some others, the Club did achieve the following team and Club honours (mainly thanks to our women players):-

- the third consecutive women's 1st Grade 50 over premiership
- the second consecutive women's 2nd Grade T20 premiership
- the women's U18 Youth Premier League premiership
- the SACA President's trophy for women's cricket
- the boys' U14 White premiership
- the SA Veterans' Cricket Association Over 50s Division 2 premiership.

In addition, several KDCC players won individual awards. Details of these awards appear later in my report.

At the start of the season, Bridget Patterson was named as vice-captain of the Scorpions.

Josh Doyle won the Fred Godson Medal for the best player in the West End Cup One Day competition.

Bridget Patterson won the Tegan McPharlin Award for team culture in the SACA awards (Redbacks, Scorpions etc) announced at the end of the season. During the season, Bridget became South Australia's second-highest run-scorer in the WNCL (behind only Karen Rolton).

Rachel Church won her fourth consecutive Marg Jude Wicketkeeping Trophy for the women's 1st Grade competition.

Shae Daly won the award for the best bowling aggregate in the women's 1st Grade competition.

Iggy Bansal won the award for the best bowling average in the women's 1st Grade competition.

Michael Davies won the award for the best batting aggregate in the men's 3rd Grade competition.

Just to keep awards in the Davies family, Amy Davies won the Fellows Award.

The joint winners of the Bradman Medal were Tom Andrews (Port Adelaide) and Kelvin Smith (West Torrens), who each polled 24 votes. Will Bowering (Glenelg) was third, with 22 votes. Lloyd Pope polled 8 votes.

The joint winners of the inaugural Sincok Medal were Tom Kelly (Sturt) and Suraj Rajesh (Adelaide), who each polled 23 votes. George O'Connor (Southern District) was third, with 17 votes.

In previous seasons, there was an award (the Bradman Medal Team Award) for the club whose players collectively polled the most votes in the Bradman Medal count. With the introduction of the two Divisions in 1st Grade, and the consequential decision to award a separate medal for the best player in Division 2, it was decided that there should be an award (simply called the Team Award) for the team whose players collectively polled the most number of votes in the Bradman Medal and Sincok Medal counts. Sturt was the inaugural winner of this new award.

As mentioned above, Josh Doyle won the Fred Godson Medal, which recognises the best player in the men's 1st Grade West End One Day Cup competition. Josh polled 14 votes. Brad Davis (Sturt) was second, with 12 votes, and Josh Kann (Northern Districts) and Jake Winter (Glenelg) were equal third, each with 11 votes.

Joe Gating (Tea Tree Gully) and Josh Kann (Northern Districts) were the joint winners of the Darren Lehmann Medal, which recognises the best player in the men's 1st Grade T20 competition, each polling 12 votes. Corey Kelly (Sturt) was third, with 8 votes. Lloyd Pope polled 5 votes.

The winner of the C W Walker Wicketkeeping Trophy (men's 1st Grade) was Isaac Conway (Port Adelaide), with 160 votes. Tom van der Jeugd (Tea Tree Gully) was second, with 158 votes, and Damon Kerr (whose club was not recorded) was third, with 154 votes. Darcy McRostie polled 126 votes.

The winner of the Talbot Smith Fielding Trophy in the men's 1st Grade competition was Sam Kerber (Adelaide University) with 39 votes. Harvey Brennan (whose club was not recorded) was second, with 35 votes, and Michael Kudra (club not recorded) was third, with 30 votes. James Cleggett and Henry Hunt were Kensington's leading vote-winners, with 13 votes each.

No Kensington players were named in the men's Premier Cricket Team of the Year. The division of the men's 1st Grade competition into two divisions was ignored for the purpose of selecting this team. The players selected in the team were Kelvin Smith (West Torrens) (captain), Conor McInerney (Glenelg), Tom Andrews (Port Adelaide), Tom Kelly (Sturt), Suraj Rajesh (Adelaide), Joe Gating (Tea Tree Gully), Josh Barrett (East Torrens) (wicketkeeper), Cameron Valente (Port Adelaide), Corey Kelly (Sturt), Campbell Thompson (East Torrens), William Bowering (Glenelg) and Luke Robins (East Torrens). Mark Harrity (West Torrens) was selected as coach of the team.

Eliza Doddridge, Rachel Church, Shae Daly and Emmerson Filsell were all named in the women's Premier Cricket Team of the Year. The players selected in that team were Alex Price (Sturt) (captain), Emma de Broughe (Sturt), Eleanor Larosa (Glenelg), Eliza Doddridge, Paris Hall (West Torrens), Sam Betts (Sturt), Rachel Church (wicketkeeper), Shae Daly, Maggie Clark (West Torrens), Lucy Bowering (Glenelg), Abbie Cawse (Sturt) and Emmerson Filsell. Daniel Murdoch (West Torrens) was selected as coach of the team.

The Jason Gillespie Medal, the award recognising the men's Grade Cricket Rising Star for the season, was won by Hamish Case (Tea Tree Gully).

The LMS and GS Hargrave Trophy, the award recognising the best U23 player in the men's 1st Grade competition, was won by Will Bowering (Glenelg).

The winner of the K C Butler Medal (men's 2nd Grade) was Daniyal Khan (Port Adelaide), with 25 votes. Adam Clements was second, with 22 votes, and Payas Bidwai (Adelaide University) was third, with 17 votes.

The winner of the Sid Daly Medal (men's 3rd Grade) was Matthew Ferraro (West Torrens), with 21 votes. Nick Huckle (whose club was not recorded) was second, with 20 votes, and Michael Davies was third, polling 16 votes.

The winner of the McLeod/Wilson Medal (men's 4th Grade) was Sid Kumra (East Torrens), polling 14 votes. Sachin Ravindran and Joel George (both of whose clubs were not recorded) were equal second, with 13 votes. Jim Kelly was fourth, polling 12 votes, and Nathan Woods was equal fifth, with 11 votes.

The winner of the Karen Rolton Medal was Alex Price (Sturt), with 31 votes. Eliza Doddridge was second, with 23 votes, and Emma de Broughe (Sturt) was third, with 20 votes. Shae Daly was equal fourth, polling 17 votes.

The winner of the Shelley Nitschke Medal for the Player of the Series in the women's 1st Grade T20 competition was Eleanor Larosa (Glenelg), with 19 votes. Sarah Lowe was second, with 17 votes, and Stephanie Beazleigh (whose club was not recorded) was third, with 13 votes.

As mentioned earlier in my report, Rachel Church won the Marg Jude Wicketkeeping Trophy for the women's 1st Grade competition (for the fourth consecutive year). Rachel polled 175 votes. Paris Hall (West Torrens) was second, with 171 votes, and Kayla McGrath (whose club was not recorded) was third, with 147 votes.

As mentioned earlier in my report, Shae Daly won the Joanne Broadbent Fielding Trophy for the women's 1st Grade competition. Shae polled 38 votes. Elizabeth Worthley (whose club was not recorded) was second, with 32 votes, and Stephanie Beazleigh (club not recorded) was third, with 22 votes.

The winner of the Lyn Fullston Medal for the women's 2nd Grade competition was Chloe Rosenzweig (Northern Districts), with 38 votes. Mackenzie McCauley (whose club was not recorded) was second, with 21 votes, and Tahlia Keylock (club not recorded) was third, with 20 votes. Francesca Queale was sixth, with 14 votes.

Sturt won the Scrymgour Trophy for the SACA Club Championship, which aggregates the match points for the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grade men's teams for each club. The division of the men's 1st Grade competition into two divisions was ignored for the purpose of calculating points for this trophy. Sturt's points totalled 665. Glenelg was second, with 590 points, and Kensington was third, with 505 points.

Prospect won the Spirit of Cricket Award for senior men's cricket, West Torrens won the Spirit of Cricket Award for the women's Grades, and Glenelg won the Spirit of Cricket Award for the junior Grades.

Kensington won the President's Trophy, which is awarded annually to the most successful club in the women's Premier Cricket competition.

As mentioned earlier in my report, Amy Davies won the Fellows Award, which is awarded annually to the most outstanding club volunteer in women's Premier Cricket. Each club nominates one person, and the winner is chosen from these nominations by the Women's Executive Committee.

In previous annual reports, my secretary's report has included details relating to the medals awarded in the men's and women's competitions in the season under review. The details for each medal have included items such as the name of the medal winner, the highest vote-winner for Kensington, the club with the highest total of votes, Kensington's total votes and the club with the lowest total of votes. Unfortunately (and as was the case last season), I cannot provide the same level of this information this year, due to the fact that the information provided by SACA to the clubs disclosed much less detail about the awards than in the seasons prior to the 2022/23 season. Accordingly, the details which follow (apart from the details for the Bradman Medal) are again much reduced when compared to the content of previous annual reports.

One of the highlights of the season was the Brown Tie Dinner, which was held at Adelaide Oval on 29 September 2023. Kensington's Team of the Century (celebrating the Club's first 100 years of participation in the SACA competition) was announced at the dinner. It had been intended to announce the Team of the Century a couple of years ago, to coincide with that centenary, but unfortunately the fall-out from the COVID-19 pandemic rather put paid to that. Matt Opie, who was then a member of the Club's Management Committee, was a prime mover behind the concept of selecting a Team of the Century. Responsibility for selecting the Team of the Century was entrusted to Matt, Peter Brinsley and Andrew Faulkner, who formed an eminently qualified panel. The main criterion for inclusion in the Team of the Century, which was adopted by the selectors, was a consideration of Club aggregates – that is, performances for the Club, as distinct from performances

in first class cricket for either South Australia or Australia. The players, and others, selected in the Team of the Century, and their aggregates, are set out below. The players were named in a notional batting order (with a 12th man), and I emphasise that the aggregates for each person are (as the case may be) runs scored, wickets taken, and A/1st Grade seasons played for the Club.

Those selected in the Team of the Century were as follows:-

- 8 John Palmer Jnr (wicket keeper) (2,106 runs, 295 dismissals, played 1993-2008)
- 9 Ian Glover (463 wickets, played 1959-1976)
- 10 Clarrie Grimmett (223 wickets, played 1928-1945)
- 11 Jamie Panelli (1,327 runs, 553 wickets, played 1998-2016)
- 12 Ross Moyle (4,452 runs, played 1930-1941)

Joint coaches – Bruce Bowley (12 seasons) and Ian Bowley (4 seasons)

Scorer – Reg Smith (scored for the Club 1926-1975)

Manager – Nugget Rees (a Club legend, and therefore no statistics required)

That same Brown Tie Dinner saw the completion of a project which had long been in the minds of many people (especially players) at the Club. This was the publication of the list of “cap numbers” for players, both men and women, who have played SACA A/1st Grade cricket for the Club. The cap numbers record, in chronological order, the players’ A/1st Grade debut for the Club. In circumstances where players debuted for the Club in the same match, a player’s position in the batting order determined that player’s cap number. Our current vice-patron John Hill (cap number 183) undertook the mammoth task of identifying the cap numbers for the Club’s male players over the 100 years of competition since the Club’s entry into the A Grade competition in the 1923-24 season. Jane Lowe took responsibility for compiling the list of cap numbers for our women players from the Club’s first season in A Grade (2008-09). That John and Jane were able to complete their respective tasks in the space of a few months is a credit to them, and I take this opportunity to thank them both for their work. The lists are a resource of enormous value to the Club, and it is now our responsibility to ensure that the lists are kept up to date and carefully maintained. Both lists appear on the Club’s website. The players, who made their debut for the men’s 1st Grade team this season, were Hayden Cesaro (cap number 437), Adam Clements (438), Ryan Percival (439) and Kyle Adams (440). The players, who made their debut for the women’s 1st Grade team this season, were Emmerson Filsell (cap number 103), Tya Gonsalves (104), Georgia Irving (105) and Lucy Lowry (106).

Now to some less happy news. Brian Slack, father of Gary and Greg, died on 26 July 2023 at the age of 88. Brian’s business, Bonnett’s Saddlery, was a long-term sponsor of the Club, and Brian

assisted the Club's Management Committee for several years in helping to attract sponsorship for the Club.

Ken (Charlie) Horsnell, a former player for the Club, died on 1 October 2023 at the age of 90. Ken played for the Club in the 1950s and 1960s, taking 215 wickets for the Club in the A Grade competition and playing first class cricket for South Australia. He continued to support and to take an active interest in the Club until his death.

In my secretary's report in last year's annual report, I mentioned (at some length) the problems associated with the introduction of the reporting system known as PlayHQ, in place of MyCricket, for use in Premier Cricket. I expressed the hope that there would be an improvement in the performance of PlayHQ in the 2023/24 season. Alas, my hopes were unrealised! It is still my view, and (I think) the view of others involved with Premier Cricket, that PlayHQ still needs a lot of improvement before one can say that it is fit for purpose. Far too much of the time of cricket's volunteers is still having to be devoted to making PlayHQ work as we would like (and expect) it to work. Despite those concerns on my part, I do acknowledge that the inclusion of much of the content of this annual report (in particular, the statistics) would be made more difficult and time-consuming in the absence of the season's records available from PlayHQ. I also acknowledge the contribution which does come from SACA's records etc, and my reliance on information available from SACUSA (the South Australian Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association).

As was the case last season, the Club fielded four teams in ATCA's T20 competition – one team (Kensington 1) in Division 1, two teams ((Kensington 2 and Old Browns) in Division 2, and one team (Kensington Mixed) in Division 3. Unfortunately, although we fielded two individual and separate teams in Division 2, ATCA again saw fit to publish only one (combined) set of batting and bowling statistics for KDCC players in those teams. In the statistics which appear later in this annual report, I have shown separate details for each team's matches played and wins and losses etc, but again I have not been able to separate the actual batting and bowling statistics for the players who played in one team or the other.

I have made some changes to the records relating to our Test and first-class players (men), which appear later in this annual report. These changes resulted from some research undertaken by Grant Chapman, and I am indebted to Grant for discovering the discrepancies which appeared in previous annual reports. The changes involve the acknowledgment that both Jeff Hammond and Andrew McDonald played first-class cricket while they were Kensington players and noting that Dean Waugh played first-class cricket while representing a club other than Kensington.

The last annual general meeting saw the retirement of Grant Chapman, Graham Dart, Peter Henderson, David Lovell and Cate Ryan from the Club's Management Committee. All of them gave much to the Club over their years of involvement on the committee, and I wish to thank them personally for all the help which they gave to me over the years.

I also take this opportunity to thank and to congratulate all the volunteers who helped the Club in any way this year. I repeat what I have said many times before – without the input from our dedicated volunteers, our Club simply would not function.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the members of Kensington District Cricket Club Inc

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report of the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc., which comprises a Statement of Receipts and Payments for the Cricket Account for the financial year ended 31st May, 2024.

Basis for Qualification

As is common for organizations of this type, it is not practicable for the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc to maintain an effective system of internal control over monies received until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, my audit in relation to receipts was limited to amounts recorded.

Auditor's Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, subject to the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had the limitation discussed in the qualification paragraph not existed, the financial report of the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc presents fairly, in all material respects, the results of the Association's Cricket Account operations for the year ended 31st May, 2024 and the balance of the Cricket Account as at that date.

Basis for opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of my report. I am independent of the entity in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's *APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our my audit of the financial report in Australia. I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

Without modifying my opinion, I draw attention to Note 1 of the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Board's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

Responsibility of the Committee of Management for the Financial Report

The Committee of Management responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* and for such internal control as the Committee members determine is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee members either intend to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Committee of Management is responsible for overseeing the Club's financial reporting process.


Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report, as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that audits conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our [my] opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the registered entity's internal control.

My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with the Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.
