1. PRESENT

3. MINUTES

In accordance with Item 9.1 of the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 09 November 2023, the minutes of that meeting were confirmed as a correct record of that meeting at a meeting of the General Committee held on 20 December 2023.

4. ANNUAL REPORT

4.1 The President, Mr Bedford, noted that, as has been the case in recent years, the Annual Report and Financial Statements had not been published in hard copy. The President also noted that, due to an oversight, the Annual Report and Financial Statements had not yet been published on the Club's website, for which he apologised, and indicated that this omission would be rectified as soon as possible.

4.2 The President tabled the electronic copy of the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the 2023/24 season. In doing so, the President mentioned the following matters:-

4.2.1 Important financial aspects mentioned in his President's Report in the Annual Report and in the Financial Statements.

4.2.2 Plans for the future of the Club, and in particular the development of high-performance pathways.

4.2.3 The establishment of the Club's database and the advantages which this will bring to communication with members and others.

4.2.4 Coaching requirements.

4.2.5 Improved marketing of the Club in order to provide the resources required to fund cricket.

4.2.6 Development of a strategic plan for the Club.

4.2.7 The redevelopment of the clubrooms.

4.2.8 The need to expand the Club's number of volunteers.

4.2.9 The Club's grounds, particularly the plans to replace the centre square wickets on Parkinson and Col. Waite Ovals and possible ways to improve outfielders.

4.2.10 The renewal and updating of the Club's constitution.

- 4.3 The Treasurer, Mr Burgess mentioned the following points regarding the Financial Statements:-
- 4.3.1 He expressed his thanks to Mr Peter Henderson for all the work which Mr Henderson had done in relation to dealing with the Club's finances.
 - 4.3.2 The Club has incurred an operational loss of about \$24,000.00 in each of the last two financial years.
 - 4.3.3 It is acknowledged that the Club must have a well-resourced high performance cricket program, but the costs of doing so are high.
 - 4.3.4 The Club is looking to increase sponsorship returns.
 - 4.3.5 Mr Bedford spoke about the costs incurred by the Club in previous seasons in entering teams in additional competitions (such as the ATCA T20 competition), and the need to recover those costs through the receipt of additional income.
- 4.4 It was proposed by the President that the Annual Report and the Financial Statements be adopted. The Treasurer seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

5. SUBSCRIPTIONS

The Treasurer reported that, in accordance with the Club's constitution, the General Committee had recommended the adoption of subscriptions for the 2024/25 season. The Treasurer reported that the following subscriptions for the 2024/25 season had been recommended, and explained the details:-

The President moved that the proposed subscriptions be adopted. The Treasurer seconded the motion.

The motion, that the subscriptions for the 2024/25 season be as noted above, was passed.

6. ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS

The President noted that the Club's constitution requires that the Committee of Management make recommendations for the nomination of those persons to be elected to the positions of Patron and Vice-Patron of the Club at the Annual General Meeting. The President reported that, at a meeting of the Committee of Management held on 17 July 2024, the Committee had recommended that Mr A J Woodcock be nominated for the position of Patron. The President further reported that, at the meeting of the Committee of Management held on 17 July 2024, the Committee had recommended that Mr J T Hill be nominated for the position of Vice-Patron.

The motions for the election of Mr A J Woodcock as Patron of the Club, and Mr J T Hill as Vice-Patron of the Club, were moved by the President, and seconded by the Honorary Secretary, Mr A Rice.

The motions were passed.

The President reported to the meeting that there was one nomination for the position of President, namely a nomination from himself. The President therefore declared that he had been duly elected to the position of President.

The President noted that the Club's Constitution allows for the election of up to ten Vice-Presidents and that, as recorded above, eight nominations for the position of Vice-President of the Club had been received. Pursuant to the Club's Constitution, the Committee of Management will use its power to fill casual vacancies in order to deal with the appointment of up to two additional Vice-Presidents.

The President noted that Messrs David Harford and Tony Risby, both of whom had served as Vice-Presidents for many years, had chosen not to re-nominate for the position this year. The President thanked them for their years of service to the Club.

The President indicated that he is looking to give greater focus to the Vice-Presidents this year.

The President welcomed Messrs Grice and Grant to the Committee.

7. ELECTION OF HONORARY AUDITOR

The President moved that Mr R Florence be appointed Auditor of the Club for the 2024/25 financial year. The Treasurer seconded the motion. In moving the motion, the President reported that Mr Florence had indicated his willingness to be appointed.

The motion was passed.

8. NOMINATION OF LIFE MEMBER

8.1 Mr Jamie Panelli nominated Mr John Palmer Snr for election as a life member of the Club. In doing so, Mr Panelli spoke about a number of matters, including the following:-

- John's initial involvement with the Club in the 1990/91 season, when he brought his son John Junior to play in the Club's Shell Shield Carnival team – John Senior's first step to a wonderful legacy was to give the Club one of its greatest players;
- at the same time, John Senior's less than successful attempt to start his own playing career with the Club, when he was very quickly given his marching (or running) orders by then senior Club coach Neil Hawke;
- John's return in the 1997/98 season with his son David, when John started his volunteer work with the Club's junior players;
- John's involvement as a member of the Club's Committee of Management for four seasons;
- the well-deserved recognition of John's contribution by the award to him of the Keith Hodder Trophy for Most Valuable Club Member in each of the 2002/03 and 2006/07 seasons;
- John's involvement, at Dean Waugh's request, as senior men's practice captain for six seasons from the 2005/06 season, and in particular his "exercise" regimen for all players whenever a bowler bowled a no ball;
- John's contribution to the social life of the Club through his "Kensi Kitchen";
- John's kindness to Nugget Rees by ferrying Nugget to and from the Club and involving Nugget in Club activities;
- John's determination to recover from significant health issues on two separate occasions; and
- John's most recent involvement as women's practice captain over the last five seasons and the accompanying reactivation of his "Kensi Kitchen".

The President noted that the Club's Committee of Management had strongly endorsed this motion.

8.2 The motion was seconded by Mr Andrew Rumbelow, who mentioned the following matters:-

- John's playing career for the Club in the Adelaide Turf Cricket Association. initially looking after a team with more senior players and then a team with younger players;

- the fact that John had won two Keith Hodder Trophies for Most Valuable Club Member, in 2002/03 and again in 2006/07, said much about the quality of John's contribution to the Club; and
- Andrew was honoured to second the nomination.

8.3 Ms Sarah Lowe spoke in support of the motion. In doing so, Ms Lowe mentioned the following matters:-

- John has been a much-loved member of the women's program at the Club;
- John's role, over five seasons, as women's practice captain;
- his help in providing meals for players and supporters; and
- his energy and enthusiasm as a supporter of the Club.

8.4 The motion was passed unanimously.

8.5 Mr Palmer spoke in reply, mentioning the following matters:-

- the nomination as a life member came as a surprise to him, but it is a great honour; and
- The Club is a wonderful club, and is a second family to him.

9. GENERAL BUSINESS

9.1 The President noted that the Keith Hodder Trophy for Most Valuable Club Member for the 2023/24 season had been awarded jointly to Messrs David and Thomas Woodcock. Unfortunately, neither of them had been able to attend the Club's formal trophy presentation in April 2024, and David was unable to attend this annual general meeting. The President presented both trophies to Thomas.

9.2 The Secretary moved that the Club's Committee of Management be constituted a sub-committee of the Annual General Meeting for the purpose of resolving that the minutes of this Annual General Meeting be confirmed as a true and correct record of the meeting. Mr M Davies seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

9.3 Mr Davies spoke about the forthcoming redevelopment of the clubrooms. Mr Davies presented and explained the most recent version of the plans for the new clubrooms and answered several questions about the redevelopment and the plans.

10. MEETING CLOSURE

There being no further business, the President closed the meeting at 9.10pm.

Key focus areas and progress

As with everything we do at Kensington, the focus is always on cricket. We are a premier club with an exceptional pedigree and well placed to enjoy further success. However, successful clubs need to be well run. With this in mind, the backroom activity to support the Club's success is being carefully planned and the following areas are a key focus.

Financial management

Significant improvements have been made by the Club in understanding and managing our finances. While the financial position has stabilised, ongoing vigilance is required. We now have detailed cost structures for each area of operation, and budgets are closely monitored to ensure sustainability. However, it remains imperative that we continue to focus on growing income streams through sponsorships, grants, fundraising initiatives and registration fee management. David Burgess has worked tirelessly to bring our finance data together, allowing the Club to make informed decisions on budgets and strategic spending.

I'd like to also thank Jane Lowe, Aaron O'Brien and David Grice for helping to pull together budgets and to assist with understanding and managing our cricket finances and the creation of those cricket budgets which enable us to have more control of and contribution to our financial wellbeing.

Clubroom development and infrastructure

With the clubrooms fully funded and design complete, we are in the process of finalising the lease conditions ready for execution by the Club and the Burnside Council. Michael Davies and the SteerCo committee have worked tirelessly over 2024/25 to get to this position, and have had a number of challenges presented by the Council which we have now managed to resolve.

We now turn our attention to our ongoing operations during both the construction phase and the opening of the new clubrooms. We are working with Burnside Rugby Club to agree our joint operation and detailed planning is now underway for the following:-

- cataloguing and storage of our Club memorabilia
- operational strategies during the build phase (training venues, presentation nights, oval use, and equipment storage)
- ongoing storage of our cricket pitch covers
- planning of the replacement of the Parkinson Oval centre square, which is scheduled to occur during clubrooms construction and will further enhance our Premier Cricket facilities.
- ongoing collaboration with Burnside Rugby Club on shared facilities management.

Veterans and Over 50s cricket

Kensington fielded two Over 50s teams in Divisions 1 and 2 last season, showcasing the Club's depth and ongoing commitment to Veterans' cricket. This remains a vital and growing part of the Club's culture, allowing past players to return to play for Kensington and for new members to become

proud Browns. Thank you to the tireless efforts of Andrew Rumbelow and Andrew Faulkner for their organisational and fundraising skills!

Vice-Presidents and fundraising

Our Vice-Presidents have re-engaged with a strong focus on fundraising activities, aligning closely with Club objectives. Their support will be pivotal as we transition into the new facilities and beyond. I'd like to personally thank our Vice-Presidents for their commitment to the Club and to Sean Rahaley and Daryl Schramm for agreeing to take on the leadership roles.

Membership database and communications

The membership database project has been successfully implemented, and we will continue to grow our member base over the coming seasons. We now possess a comprehensive system covering past players, current members, life members, sponsors, and supporters. This has allowed for targeted and regular communication, improving engagement across all levels of the Club and providing regular updates from the committee. Many thanks to Darren Matthews and Daryl Schramm for their work on the database.

Compliance and governance

- Working with Children compliance is now in excellent shape, thanks to the efforts of Esther Sterk.
- The Club has made significant strides in updating its constitution and improving governance structures, including delegation of authority frameworks.
- A formal strategic plan (CSP) will be launched early next season to align all areas of the Club under a unified direction.

Sponsorship and marketing

With an eye on the opportunities presented by the new clubrooms, a refreshed marketing and sponsorship plan is being developed to position Kensington as the premier cricket brand in Adelaide. Efforts to engage new commercial partners are under way, and further activation of the Kensington brand will be a key priority in 2025/26. David Grant will lead this extremely important activity

Club operations

We will clearly be impacted by the construction of the new clubrooms, the schedule for which (at the time of writing) looks like we'll start demolition in December or January next. We'll likely use the Kensington Hotel during our period without clubrooms, but I'd just like to thank Michael 'Sully' Sullivan and Peter Henderson for their tireless efforts to stock the bar during a very challenging season without our walk-in cool room! This led to some innovative thinking and novel use of a freezer to keep cool the drinks which our players and members deserve!

Season 2025/26 and beyond

The work done in 2024/25 has laid a strong foundation for the years ahead. Next season's priorities include:-

- planning our operations through our clubroom construction
- transitioning smoothly into the new clubrooms
- Increasing our marketing capability that allows us to expand and strengthen our commercial partnerships in support of our Premier Cricket
- building on recent on-field successes to maintain our status as a Premier Cricket club in South Australia

- further developing our social and fundraising activities, particularly through the active involvement of our Vic- Presidents, Veterans and past player networks
- exploring overseas partnerships, particularly with clubs in the UK and Ireland, to establish reciprocal player development opportunities.

In conclusion, while financial challenges remain, our collective efforts over the past 12 months have placed Kensington on a firm path forward. Our culture, facilities, people, and strategic focus, especially with the opportunities presented by our new clubrooms, will ensure that we are poised for sustained success both on and off the field.

DEVELOPMENT SQUAD COACH'S REPORT

This season, Kensington District Cricket Club set out to further strengthen the integration of young players into our senior program. A key change was the full inclusion of our U17s and U18s into the senior structure. While this created some logistical challenges, particularly around training capacity and school commitments, it also delivered significant benefits in both player development and on-field performance.

Player Development Highlights

Our Development Squad is committed to balancing player growth with competitive success. This year, the results were particularly encouraging:-

- 20 players under 17 years of age participated in more than 150 senior games across 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grades.
- Of these, two players debuted in 2nd Grade, 10 played 3rd Grade, and 17 featured in 4th Grade during the season.
- Seven of these young players contributed to our 3rd and 4th Grade semi-final teams.
- This marks a 60% increase in young player participation compared to the previous season.

Importantly, several players have progressed into higher representative pathways as a direct result of these opportunities, reaffirming our commitment to long-term player development. Ultimately, our role in development is to support and develop players that show the capability of playing 1st Grade cricket for KDCC, or even higher.

Team Performance Summary

Our squads delivered strong performances across the grades:-

- **3rd Grade:** finished second, narrowly missing a grand final spot with a four-run semi-final loss.
- **4th Grade:** finished fourth – a semi-final loss by eight runs. Crowned T20 premiers with a youthful side.
- **U18s:** undefeated in the minor round (five wins from five games), finishing top. A disappointing semi-final loss ended our campaign.
- **U17s:** a vital competition offering school-aged players a bridge from juniors. Fielded 21 players across nine games (three games lost to weather). Finished fourth with six wins, losing the semi-final to Glenelg by one wicket.

1st GRADE

What an amazing year this was for the 1st Grade team; three grand finals and two premierships with a group of players and support staff that never knew when they were beaten.

The early parts of the season were aimed at ensuring that we would get ourselves away from the bottom two teams after going so close to relegation the previous season. A couple of wins pre-Christmas gave us some breathing space, and we looked forward to putting more performances together to get ourselves to the business end of the season.

The day belonged to Ledds though, taking four wickets and getting us off to a start with the bat to be the Rob Zadow Medallist.

In the regular season red ball games, we had a great stretch of wins locking us into the finals, and we ended up finishing fourth and facing Sturt in the semi-final. On the back of a classy hundred from Henry Dall, and an amazing first over from Shiv Channa on debut, we were able to knock off Sturt comprehensively and we were into our third grand final of the season.

Batting first in the grand final against Tea Tree Gully at Woodville Oval, we were unable to grab complete control, losing wickets at key moments to be 9/150 just after tea. 2nd GRADE

This season was a significant one in terms of player movement and loss for the 2nd Grade. From our grand final side the previous season, five of the eleven did not play a single game in 2nd Grade this year, with another couple playing only a handful of games. This included three of our top five in both run-scoring and wicket-taking categories. Despite this significant turnover, we had optimism and confidence going into the season, knowing many players had done significant work in the 3rd Grade and were ready to make the step up.

Across the first six games, before the T20 and Christmas break, we managed to put together a four-win, two-loss record, including a hard-fought final over chase against reigning premier Tea Tree Gully and a comfortable win over a much-improved West Torrens, who were around the mark all season. A tough loss against Sturt and a one-wicket loss against Glenelg dampened our record, but we had been playing some good cricket and knew our best was as good as anyone in the competition.

The reintroduction of T20 competition in lower grades saw us take a break from the main competition over December. We viewed this competition as a great competition to gain exposure to the T20 format and, ideally, experience some success. With only a four-game season and the top two qualifying straight for the grand final, we knew it was a matter of needing to win all four. Unfortunately, a loss against a strong Tea Tree Gully side cost us that opportunity, but we played some exceptional cricket, with all three wins being extremely comfortable. Euan Fletcher and Seb McVann led the way for us in this competition with bat and ball respectively and showed our younger players what it looked like to be effective in the T20 format.

When we look back at the season, the two weeks straight after Christmas are what hurts the most and ultimately cost us our season. We played two sides we would expect to beat but didn't play anywhere near our best cricket and lost two winnable games. Following this, we knew it would be hard to make the top four but, following an honest chat heading into our final three games, we had belief. We needed to secure two outright victories and win all three. We completed the first task, gaining two outstanding and clinical outright victories against Southern District and Woodville. This set up a final game showdown with Adelaide University, with the winner getting a home final and the loser missing the four. 3rd GRADE

The beginning of the 2024/25 season brought many new faces through to the Development group and the 3rd Grade playing squad. Great to see a large increase in the number of junior players moving through to the seniors, testament to the collaboration between the two programs that has received significant attention over the previous years.

We got off to a great start with a strong win over Sturt, but a few weeks of poor weather and an unlikely tied game against Port Adelaide culminated in a melancholy first few months of cricket.

After the wet start, consistent cricket kicked off in mid-November with a home game against the longstanding 3rd Grade nemesis – Glenelg. We were put into bat on what looked a greenish wicket. Club legend and life member Simon Schwerdt didn't look too bothered and began the day winding back the clock with numerous lofted cover drives into the creek and the patented back-foot drive. The Kensi Facebook post "The Rock is Cooking at the Col" was perfectly put as Simon moved toward a century against a very reasonable Seahorses attack. Simon would end up 101 off 124 balls, with 20 boundaries for the day, helping us to a reasonable 214. Unfortunately, day 2 wasn't our day with a seventh wicket 100 run partnership leading the outcome towards the Bays, but an outstanding individual performance from Schwerdt gave ominous signs for the opposition to come.

Given the new T20 format, the regular season paused for the year in late November, after an important win over Prospect, to leave us within range of the top four coming into Christmas.

Our young talent shone throughout the T20 competition, with notable performances from Archer Parisi, Jay Temme and Oli Ellis highlighting some of the prospects for our Club in years to come. We took a development focus into the four-game series and finished with an even two wins, two losses – with some great learnings for our squad.

A clinical win against Adelaide was followed by a ninth wicket chase against a typically errant East Torrens, Simon Schwerdt again staring with an unbeaten 89 to drag us over the line. First year player Achyut Chopra showed form with a classy 78 against Northern Districts as we began to find some consistency as a team, and Oli Ellis showed great pace and an increasing variety to take four wickets in another strong win.

Coming into the Round 10 bye round, we were precariously placed outside the top four, a win away from the finals group with three games remaining for the season.

Southern District offered us the chance to return to the top four, with Simon Schwerdt continuing his incredible form to dominate the first day with his second hundred for the season, scoring 119 off 123 balls with 17 boundaries and a great display of how to build an innings for the onlooking development players. A few wickets early on day 1, and there was a belief amongst the group that there may be more than just the first innings points to play for next week.

On day 2 we were able to slowly remove the chance of a losing outcome from the opposition and, at the tea break, an agreement was made to 'double declare' and give the opposition the chance of an outright win in the second innings, needing 175 in 40 overs. This was looking a poor decision as the Stingrays raced to 60 off the first six overs of the second innings. First year senior player Samarbir Singh was brought into the attack, and he viciously took the game away from Southern in an incredible display of leg spin bowling, the 15 year old looking unfazed by senior batsmen in taking six wickets.

Back in the top four, a Round 12 win would secure a finals position. Cameron Winen was clinical in a sharp spell of opening bowling, dismissing Woodville for 104 in the first innings. From there it was a collective effort to secure our second outright win in as many weeks and, most importantly, securing a home final for the 3rd Grade.

This set up a semi-final berth against Adelaide University on Parkinson Oval, a great opportunity to play on the main ground against a strong opposition of mature (in age) cricketers. We started well with the ball, with wickets falling consistently throughout the first session. Unfortunately, taking wickets in the afternoon session proved particularly difficult and we let Adelaide Uni scrape to 167,

a very gettable total. In reality, however, it was probably 60 more than they should have made, given the position they were in.

Our innings got off to a poor start in the evening on day 1, as we lost Sam Davison before stumps. On day 2, we had a few partnerships, but unfortunately not enough runs came from the top six and we looked unlikely to challenge their total. Seb Rice batted incredibly well, with an under-pressure 45, to give us a chance, but unfortunately we fell a few runs short of what was required to move on to the next week. I'm always proud to be a Brown, but especially so on a weekend where the 3rd Grade played competitive/tough cricket in a spirit that left our competitors with some lessons to learn from their junior counterparts.

It was another great season from the 3rd Grade, ultimately falling short of the finish we wanted, but being competitive with the young squad we had was a great sign for years to come.

The end of the season also brought about the playing retirement of an incredible Brown, Simon Schwerdt. He finished his career with the SACA award for top run-scorer in the 3rd Grade competition, with over 500 runs. More than a run-scorer, Schwerdt has been a great leader, player and Club man and friend. His contribution to the Browns cannot be overstated, and he'll continue to be part of the furniture at the Browns for a long time. A big thank you, Simon, and congratulations on a brilliant career.

As always, thank you to the incredible coaches, especially Matt Cesaro and Russell Thompson, and to all those who support the playing groups. Special thanks to Tom Woodcock, who remains the core of the 3rd Grade, as team manager and scorer - we thoroughly appreciate your contribution to our team.

Congratulations to the men's and women's 1st Grade teams on their premierships. Next year the 3rd. Grade will be looking to follow in your footsteps; here's hoping.

4th GRADE

This season brought yet again another format change for the 4th Grade team. All games of the regular season would be played in one day coloured kit and with 40 overs a side. REPORT FROM CO-ORDINATOR OF WOMEN'S CRICKET

Once again, we can reflect positively on the past season for our women's program at Kensington. Our teams enjoyed on-field successes, individual players achieved personal recognition and awards, we continued the strong off-field support of our players' well-being and development, and our support networks increased in numbers.

All our women's teams again competed in finals this season. Our 1st Grade created history by winning their fourth consecutive One Day grand final. Unfortunately, yet again, the team was unlucky in missing the T20 final, with the weather working against us this time. Our 2nd Grade won the T20 grand final from third on the ladder, with two fighting wins on a hot day at Glenelg. This is their third consecutive win in that competition. Sadly, they again failed to make finals in the One Day competition. Our young 3rd Grade team was promoted to ATCA's Division 1 this season, and finished the season in third position, losing a hard-fought semi-final to eventual premiers Payneham. The U18 competition did not have a final this season, and our team finished second on the ladder, with a marginally lesser net run rate than Adelaide.

As mentioned previously, Ruby Smith moved interstate to study, so unfortunately was also lost from our Academy coaching ranks. SENIOR COACH'S REPORT

I started last year's report with "These Brown Girls are an incredible group of athletes" and finished it with "Dare we dream of four".

As I sit here writing the report for 2024/25 and glancing at the team's photo celebrating their fourth premiership in a row, I see myself scribing the same words as before, and before that, even before that and then before that again. I reiterate once again, this is one of the greatest teams our Club and competition has seen.

This is probably not going to be a surprise to our female players, and this may sound a little controversial or even strange to others, but our premierships are not the greatest highlight this program gives - the development and growth as humans is far more of our shining light. Hand on heart, observing our girls grow as people and playing for each other is just incredible. This is why they are incredible athletes but even more incredible humans.

Our players are proud to play for Kensington and are the hardest-working in the competition. Unfortunately, the training, the effort and previous three premierships don't guarantee another premiership and, as I mentioned, our measure of success is only part silverware and majority about our females enjoying their environment, building a thriving high-performance program and being the best version of themselves through cricket and our Club culture.

Our season just gone had a degree of sameness, but this season required a number of our players to overcome personal, family and health tribulations. Bridget Patterson was diagnosed with Stage 3 melanoma, and cricket was as far from her and our minds as it could be. This was our time to show our care and love when she needed it the most. At times it was emotional and heavy-hearted, and for most probably a good excuse either not to play or to underperform, and with good reason. Instead, our girls just connected and cared more for each other than ever before and used their wonderful community and bond to help their mate in need. Bridget, as she does, focused on her recovery and health with such determination. Glad to say the season passed, Bridget is healthy and stronger than ever before, and our team is just that as well.

From a senior team list perspective we experienced significant change, probably the most in the last decade, as we had seven changes to our 1st Grade premiership side of 2023/24. However, as we know, change can give rise to an opportunity to add and replenish our squad, bringing in different skills sets and also different dynamics.

We welcomed the following new players/staff to our set up:-

- Zanzibar Menzies (UK) – pace bowler
- Natasha McBean (UK) – spinner
- Rebecca Stokell (IRE) - batter
- Elsa Barnfather (UK) – batter
- Abby Collihole (Mildura) – batter
- Jade Gersch (QLD) – batter
- Jakarra Hill (player, returning after nine years) – all-rounder
- Peter Henderson – practice manager

Who would have thought for all these players that their first chapter (or returning chapter for Jakarra) would be so memorable.

This season, led by Jakarra Hill (assistant coach) in collaboration with the players, they defined their true team values:-

- **Acceptance**
- **Unconditional**
- **Work Ethic**

We took our time to cultivate and curate these three important values, and to see these in their arrival but then lived every week was very special and kept us focused on what really matters to our success. I couldn't think of three more relevant behaviours to guide our players through this season and beyond. With the challenges preceding this season, these would become our oaths.

Each preseason we turn our attention to an alternative sport or activity to bring some fun and diversity to our program. This year it was fencing. Our Browns' process is "Own the pressure, absorb and transfer it, move the game forward, and then control to finish the game". Fencing gave a nice spin on this, and we recalled the synergies and learnings a number of times during the season. Previously, it has been gymnastics, rock climbing and hiking.

We stuck to our usual pre-season craft/nets and outdoor sessions, including a select group of juniors from our pathway joining us, and then rounded the pre-season out with trial games against SA U19s Pathway and Sturt.

T20 competition

We were good in the T20s, but finished third again, and our competition only has a grand final involving the top two. We have been in pursuit of the ultimate T20 success and have played some good cricket. We were one win away and had second with the best net run rate. We are getting close. I have said this for a couple of seasons now, but we look forward to next season.

Our skipper Sarah Lowe led from the front, and Eliza Doddridge was important with the ball.

We were good without being outstanding. Our ultimate success in T20 is still very much a goal, and we will continue to strive to make this a reality.

ATCA was a good opportunity for us to get more T20 cricket in, and against our arch-rivals the men. Courtney Neale was our skipper this season and did a brilliant job.

Big congratulations to our skipper Sarah Lowe, who won the Shelley Nitschke Medal for the 1st Grade T20 competition.

50 overs competition

Like previous seasons, except last (2023/24), we finished third and locked in a semi-final against Sturt.

Reminder - the top three make the finals in our 1st Grade Women's Premier Competition.

We had plenty of individual performances once again.

A single century this season went to Bridget Patterson against Glenelg. Congratulations to Eliza for taking a 'Bag of 5' wickets against Sturt.

Bridget Patterson, Courtney Neale and Emmerson Filsell all featured for South Australia. Bridget's season included captaining the team and playing her 100th one day game for South Australia, as well as playing in the Australian Green versus Gold squad games.

Indira Panelli represented the State in the SA School Sports (SSA) 15s and Under (captain and All-Australian selection), U16s SA (captain), U19s and Second XI. She also played in the Lanning /Perry (Australian U17s) squad matches at the end of the season.

Lucy Lowry played in the SSA 15s and Under and in the U16s.

Jade Gersch represented Queensland in the SSA 15s and Under.

2nd GRADE COACH'S REPORT

Once again, the Kensington Women's Development Program had a wonderful year both on and off the field. Under women's development is our Academy, the new U15 T20 competition, the U18 T20 carnival and the senior 2nd & C Grade teams.

The Academy program was held once again this season on Monday nights, led by current players Eliza Doddridge and Ayisha Salah. The young development players thoroughly enjoyed the sessions, where they focused on building their core skills. This program played a key role in supporting the progression of players into the new U15 carnival.

The U15 competition was an initiative introduced by SACA this season, featuring Saturday afternoon T20 matches predominantly played on hard wickets. With a strong focus on creating a clear development pathway into our senior teams, we were eager to be part of this program. We consistently fielded teams that combined experienced senior players with promising new talent. The group was capably led by captain Olivia Temme, whose leadership set a great tone throughout the season. Highlights included a thrilling one-run victory against Port Adelaide, secured by a dramatic run-out on the final ball, and an outstanding individual performance from Phoebe Taylor, who scored an unbeaten 50 off just 25 deliveries. Abby Bain was the leading run-scorer for the team, amassing 92 runs at an impressive average of 46, while Ava Foote claimed the most wickets, taking six at an average of 17. We are hopeful that SACA will continue this competition in the future, providing even more opportunities for our young players to represent the Club at the junior level before progressing into senior cricket.

In January, our U18s participated in a short T20 competition held across three days, with the premiership awarded to the team topping the ladder after five rounds. We assembled a strong side featuring players from our 1st, 2nd and C Grade squads, with Indi Panelli leading the team superbly as captain. We won four out of our five matches, narrowly finishing second on the ladder by just 0.01% - a heartbreaking margin that saw us miss out on the premiership. Throughout the tournament we produced several excellent all-round team performances. Indi Panelli was our leading run-scorer, finishing third overall in the competition with 133 runs at an average of 33. Meanwhile, Olivia Temme and Abby Collihole shared the title of leading wicket-taker for the entire competition, each claiming seven wickets. It was a highly encouraging campaign, and we are proud of the way the team represented the Club.

Traditionally, the 2nd Grade season begins with the T20 competition before transitioning to 40-over one day matches leading into Christmas. However, this season the format was adjusted - the number of T20 games was reduced and moved to the middle of the season, and greater emphasis was placed on one day matches. Our 2nd Grade team performed exceptionally well, winning four of their six T20 matches, finishing second on the ladder and securing a place in the finals. There were several stand-out moments during the home-and-away season. One memorable match was our thrilling super over victory against Sturt, after both teams tied on 112. As players were preparing to shake hands, the umpires confirmed a super over would decide the winner. Special mention goes to Phoebe Taylor, who, after over a year away from cricket due to injury, bowled the super over superbly, conceding just five runs for one wicket. Another highlight was Sarah Telfer's outstanding innings of 102no off 70 balls against Northerns - a remarkable individual performance. Finishing second meant we faced Sturt in the semi-final, with the grand final scheduled for later the same day against the top-ranked Glenelg. Bowling first in the semi-final, our bowlers shared the wickets, with Isabel Durant leading the way with figures of 3/9, helping to dismiss Sturt for 76. Our openers then executed a clinical chase, reaching the target with only one wicket down in the 14th over. After a short turnaround, we batted first in the grand final against Glenelg. Despite a shaky start, Martha Roberts and Abby Bain built a vital partnership, helping us to post 7/88. Tight, disciplined bowling - conceding just four extras - and strong fielding efforts kept Glenelg under constant pressure, with only one of their players reaching double figures. We bowled them out for 56. Wickets were again shared among the team, but Martha Roberts was named Player of the Final with an excellent all-round performance: 23 runs, 3/12 with the ball, and the winning catch. This victory marked the third

consecutive T20 premiership for the "B Power" — a fantastic achievement and a special milestone for our young captain, Shannon Calvert.

While our one day competition campaign was not as successful as our T20 season, with five wins recorded, it was marked by significant individual performances and strong development across the squad. The longer format provided valuable opportunities for our young group, which included a mix of senior players, younger 2nd Graders and C Graders stepping up into 2nd Grade. Each player embraced the challenge and showed great growth throughout the season. With our regular opening batters often promoted to 1st Grade, new opportunities arose. These were largely filled by Abby Bain and Madeleine Hyde, two young players who have worked extremely hard and proven that they are more than capable at the top of the order - a combination we expect to see for many seasons to come. Isabel Durant had an outstanding season with the ball, consistently taking between two and four wickets each game, highlighted by a superb 5/16 performance against Adelaide. Another standout was Olivia Temme, who began the season with her then-highest score of 54 off 77 balls against University, before surpassing it later with a brilliant 100 off 94 balls in Round 12 against Adelaide - her first century. These achievements are just a few examples of the rewards for the hundreds of hours of hard work put in by this group. Arguably the youngest squad in the competition, they continue to impress with their commitment, improvement, and resilience. As I have always said, this is the best squad in Premier Cricket, and there is no doubt that they will continue to deliver outstanding individual and team performances in the seasons ahead.

A special thank you must go to the Club for its ongoing support of the Women's Program, with particular recognition to Tony Bedford, Jane Lowe, and Jamie Panelli for their continued efforts behind the scenes. Thank you also to Darren Bain (C Grade coach) and Jay Temme (Assistant Development Coach) for their work in coaching the girls this season, and to our team managers, Georgi Roberts and Alex Dolling, for their invaluable support. Our thanks also extend to the parents, who have been fantastic throughout the season: always willing to assist with scoring, umpiring, and organising afternoon teas. Your support is truly appreciated. Congratulations and thank you to our team leaders - Sarah Lowe (1st Grade), Shannon Calvert (2nd Grade), and Ayisha Salah (C Grade) - for their leadership and commitment this season. A special mention must go to Shannon Calvert, who has stepped into the 2nd Grade captaincy role and shown tremendous growth as a leader. The B Power are certainly in great hands moving forward. Lastly, to everyone who has been part of this journey, thank you. This season marks my final year as an official coach within the program, having started with Jamie in the 1st Grade side during the 2017/18 season and moving into the 2nd Grade role in the 2020/21 season. I am incredibly proud of the program that we have built and everyone who has contributed to its ongoing strength and success. Most of all, I am proud of our players, who continue to uphold Kensington's legacy of hard work, high performance, premierships, and, above all, enjoyment.

CAPTAINS' REPORTS

1st GRADE

History makers! A fitting title for a program that continues to ask more of itself and to set the standard for the competition. What this title doesn't capture is what the group overcame in the last 12 months to create that history. A fourth successive SACA One Day Premier Cricket Premiership lands the women's 1st Grade as the Club's first A Grade team to complete a 4-peat. It also matches Port Adelaide's feat in the women's competition, which was achieved over two decades ago in a very different-looking competition.

Turn the clock back 12 months however, and this moment was a long way from being realised. The team was still on a high from the 3-peat, and eager to make it four, but significant change was ahead. Five of the players from that team of 12 were moving on for a variety of reasons – study, work,

returning to England or pursuing opportunities in other sports. Add to this, your most elite player is diagnosed with cancer. The only guarantee at this point was change.

Change was something that the group took in their stride. We welcomed Natasha McBean, Zanzibar Menzies and Elsa Barnfather from the UK, Rebecca Stokell (an Irish International) for a cameo at the start of the season, Jakarra Hill returned in a playing capacity after nine seasons out of the game, as well as Abby Colihole from Mildura and Jade Gersch from Queensland. Outside of Jakarra, all of these players made their 1st Grade debuts. We also saw several of our home-grown players debut, including Teju Jayaprakash, Martha Roberts and Olivia Temme. The number of debutants was significant, but highlighted the group's ability to connect, adapt and take opportunities when they arose.

Our success was underpinned by a high-performance program that prioritises connection and creates a space for players to improve themselves as cricketers and people. Pre-season featured an expanded high-performance squad, which supported the development of our emerging players. We were also joined by many of the junior boys. It has been great to see how these programs overlap and the success that this has brought players in both programs. This was also on display in many of our ATCA T20 games, which featured a mix of female and junior players each week and, of course, Jamie Panelli.

The season started with a block of one day cricket, which saw us reach the T20 season with a 5-1 win-loss record. An impressive start given the relatively little time the group had spent together.

The T20 competition remains a "what if" for this program. We once again finished in third position and outside the final. A wash-out and some missed moments saw us a game behind Sturt and Glenelg come finals time. When the competition finished, it again felt as though we had let an opportunity slip. Some more consistent performances, and a better showing of our T20 batting, remain key motivators for the squad in this space.

Following the T20 season, the return of one day cricket saw a mix of results which left us in third place at the end of the minor round. The competition was tight across the board, with one win separating the teams from first to third. For the second time in three years, it was a semi-final match up against Sturt at Price Memorial Oval. And what a game it was! The fight, character and ability for this team to win from any position has become a feature in recent years. After we posted 188, Sturt seemingly had the chase in control until the wickets broke open and Sturt lost 6/34, including three run-outs, to end four runs short. Incredible! Roll on grand final week...

A clinical performance with the ball and in the field meant Glenelg never stood a chance. We lost a few more wickets than we should have in the chase, but all in all the game was all ours and a fourth successive premiership was secured. We have now won seven of the last eleven premierships, and the exciting thing is it feels like this current playing group has so much upside.

The season was highlighted by these clutch key moments and milestones but was underpinned by the continued growth of women's cricket at the Club. A highlight for many players this season was the women's program training session, which saw the whole program train as one for the night. The continued growth and engagement across the program is something to behold. You can't help but have a smile on your face on a Wednesday night when training is in full swing. Credit to Ayisha Salah and Darren Bain for the success the C Grade saw in moving up to ATCA Division 1 and playing finals. It is also important to acknowledge the sustained success of the 2nd Grade, who claimed a 3-peat in the T20 competition. Congratulations to Shannon Calvert and Nick Holmes, who were also assisted by Jay Temme, on this and the development throughout the year.

Many of our players achieved individual honours throughout the season. Bridget Patterson, Courtney Neale and Emmerson Filsell all featured for South Australia. Bridget's season included captaining the team and playing her 100th one day game for South Australia (and she is only the second player to do so) as well as playing in the Australian Green versus Gold squad games. Indira Panelli represented the State in SSA 15s and Under (captain and all Australian selection), U16s (captain), U19s and Second XI, and she also played in the Lanning/ Perry squad matches at the end

of the season. Lucy Lowry played in the SSA 15s and Under and U16s, whilst Jade Gersch represented Queensland in the SSA 15s and Under. 2nd GRADE

For the second consecutive year, no report was submitted.

C GRADE

The 2024/25 season for the C Grade had a focus on consolidating the gains made in our first season together, while also building on our past achievements, to prove to ourselves that we are a group that can contribute to the Club's culture of consistent performance, year in year out.

Looking back at the beginning of the season, there were many similarities to last year, particularly on how we would meet the new challenges presented to us.

Our record from last year warranted promotion from Division 2 to Division 1 of the ATCA women's competition, and, with that, an increased level of competition, playing not only against four teams associated with other SACA clubs, but also teams with established older players and a greater depth and level of talent than previously encountered.

Our entrance into Division 1 would also coincide with the introduction of 30 over cricket for the first time within the ATCA competition. For many of our players, this would be the first contact with a longer form of cricket, demanding a higher level, sustained for a longer period of time, with a contribution from deeper into the team line-up.

With all of this in mind, I was wary of the possibility of a difficult season while we adjusted to the level. The players on the other hand showed that they had a very different view on this.

The qualities of this young group that I admire again came to the fore, taking on these challenges without being intimidated by the game, the competition or any situation.

The season was book-ended by three notable team performances, starting with our first T20 game away against West Torrens. Winning the toss and putting the opposition in, a sharp catch in gully by our youngest player, within the first two overs, set a tone which led to dismissing them for 40 and then chasing the total within seven overs. This was a statement, firstly to rest of the competition that we were not there to make up numbers, and secondly to inform our expectations of the season.

From that point we progressed through the minor round that included victories against every other SACA team represented in the competition.

The last minor round 30 over game saw us host Port Adelaide, who we had met in last year's grand final. A win would ensure a finals spot, a loss would leave us dependent on other results. Again, our players showed the ability to deliver in a must-win game, bowling them out for 48 and chasing the total with two wickets down.

This left us third after the minor round with eight wins and six losses, giving us another chance to experience finals cricket in a semi-final against Payneham. This game delivered our best all-round, even contribution of the year, with three bowlers taking multiple wickets. Four of our top order batters making over 20, and our fielding, kept us in the game. Falling 17 runs short in a run chase of 147, we did push the team, which was to go on to win the grand final, right to the end.

The season saw individual improvement from every player, with special mention to the following:-

- Hayley Rutter (61) and Macy Foreman (52no) scoring their first 50s for the Club
- Lily Edgecombe on two occasions taking four wickets, including 4/23 in the semi-final
- Hayley Rutter, Lily Edgecombe, Ava Foote and Gracie Lloyd in the top ten Association wicket-takers.

Congratulations to the players who received recognition from ATCA for their outstanding performance across the season:-

- Hayley Rutter winning the Association bowling trophy with 19 wickets
- Lily Edgecombe and Hayley Rutter named in the Association Team of the Year.

The team was captained brilliantly by Ayisha Salah, guiding the team through every game this season. It is no coincidence that the growth of the team capabilities has followed Ayisha's leadership.

Special thanks to team manager Alex Dolling for the organisation and support provided to the team throughout the year, and particularly on game days.

Thank you to the parents who took on roles of scoring and umpiring - your contribution is essential to game day. To all of the parents who attend week in week out, thank you. The team is a young group in a senior competition, and your support for all of the players is appreciated by the players and by the coach.

At the beginning of the season we were looking for consolidation; by the end of the season we had achieved progression, while having fun doing it. Well done on another great year.

REPORT FROM CO-ORDINATOR OF JUNIOR BOYS' CRICKET

Well done to all players on a very successful and enjoyable 2024/25 cricket season.

This year marked the first year of the age group changes as directed by SACA at the end of the 2023/24 season, which presented significant challenges to the selection process and player structure. Adding to this was the ever-growing number of our private school-based juniors who were selected into their schools' First Xis (and a huge congratulations to all those players). While this provides us with challenges in managing team lists, it is a wonderful testament to the quality of the players that the Club is producing, representing not only their respective schools, but also ultimately are part of the Kensington pathway into the senior ranks.

A huge thanks must go to our Junior Head Coach, Ben Johnswood, who not only navigated the challenges of managing this new structure but also needed to create a completely new system of selection and player management, ensuring we were able to field teams each week. Ben also endured the weekly challenge of managing the ins and outs, including navigating school commitments, player availability and injuries.

In addition to this, our Club made the innovative move to have the U17 and U18 players included within the senior program. In my opinion, this was a stroke of genius and enabled our older juniors to gain valuable experience while training with our men's teams and further develop their skills, which significantly assisted in transitioning those players into senior cricket.

Our SACA Premier Cricket junior teams all performed strongly:-

- the U15.5 team - T20 grand finalists (runners-up) and finished fifth in the Premier Competition.
- the U14 team – finished sixth in the Premier Competition and third in the T20 competition.
- the Ray Sutton Shield team – finished fourth, won their quarter-final, but sadly their semi-final was heated out. They also finished fourth in the T20 competition.

A number of our junior players made the transition to senior cricket and acquitted themselves well.

We always try to challenge our most talented players whenever the opportunity presents and performances demand. At times we saw U14 players jump up and represent our U15.5s, U15.5 players transitioning into U17 and U18 competitions (now managed under the seniors), and some U13 players representing the U14s. Some Academy players were promoted to U13 level. It is heartening to see young players seize these opportunities and embrace this experience.

Academy

Running underneath our SACA Premier Cricket structure, the Kensington Academy continued on Monday nights, with metropolitan and hills-based teams. The program involves a number of training sessions plus some fiercely fought internal battles. We also played matches against other Premier Cricket clubs to test ourselves against strong opposition. We hope that players have fun being part of this program and are excited about progressing through the Kensington pathway. It is crucial that the Club has a wide base of talented young players to draw on. It's part of the Club's mission to see a number of players, who started in our Academy, debuting as senior players and taking the field. Many of these players are now coaching our junior teams.

Tony Bedford has been doing a mountain of work behind the scenes to put structures in place to help the Club run smoothly and to build financial stability now and into the future. Tony has a passion for the Club and a strong vision of what we can be, and I cannot thank him enough for his support and direction as I took on the role of Junior Coordinator for the first time this season.

Thanks must also go to the parents and players who embraced our Junior Initiative, where the junior players served the Club through running the barbeque and raising funds for the Club. The juniors raised approx. \$1,200.00 for the Club throughout the 2024/25 season.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The 2024/25 season was certainly a successful one for the Club. The men's 1st Grade team, having narrowly avoided relegation to Division 2 at the end of the 2023/24 season, won the premiership in the Division 1 two-day competition by the barest of margins in a classic, hard-fought grand final. This was the first time since the 2001/02 season that the 1st Grade team had won the premiership from fourth position at the end of the minor round. This was the Club's 19th A/1st Grade premiership; by way of comparison, East Torrens has won 16, and Sturt and West Torrens each 14, A/1st Grade premierships. The men's 1st Grade team also won the One Day Cup premiership – its eighth in that competition. Our women's 1st Grade team continued its recent domination of the 1st Grade 50 over competition, winning its fourth consecutive premiership, and sixth in all, in that competition. Again by way of comparison, Northern District has won seven, and Port Adelaide six, premierships in that competition. Port Adelaide is the only other club to have won four consecutive premierships in that 50 over competition. Our women's 2nd Grade team continued its run of success in the 2nd Grade T20 competition, winning its third consecutive, and fifth in all, premiership in that competition. Our men's 4th Grade team won the Club's first premiership in the 4th Grade T20 competition, meaning that the Club has now won a premiership in each of the four men's Grades T20 competitions.

The 2024/25 season was the second season played under the two-division structure in the men's 1st Grade competition. At the end of the previous season (2023/24), SACA conducted a review of this structure; included in that review was a review of the participation of the SACA U19 team in Division 2 and a review of the rules regarding selection of players in the U19 team. The result of that review was a decision by SACA that no changes would be made to the two-division structure or to the participation of, and the rules regarding selection of players in, the SACA U19 team for the 2024/25 season. The completion of the 2024/25 season saw the relegation of Glenelg and Adelaide University to Division 2 and the return of East Torrens and Woodville to Division 1. Kyle Adams and Ryan Percival were Kensington players who played for the U19s during the season.

The Club achieved the following team and Club honours this season:-

- the men's 1st Grade Division 1 premiership
- the men's 1st Grade One Day Cup premiership
- the fourth consecutive women's 1st Grade 50 over premiership
- the third consecutive women's 2nd Grade T20 premiership
- the men's 4th Grade T20 premiership
- the Spirit of Cricket Award for women's cricket.

In addition, several KDCC players won individual awards. Details of these awards appear later in my report.

Bridget Patterson was named as vice-captain of the Scorpions and captained the team in the final minor round match in the WNCL competition. During the season, Bridget became only the second player to play 100 WNCL matches for South Australia – only Karen Rolton has played more WNCL matches (114) for South Australia. Finally, to cap off an outstanding season, Bridget won (for the second successive year) the Tegan McPharlin Award for team culture in the SACA awards (Redbacks, Scorpions etc) announced at the end of the season.

Sarah Lowe had a wonderful season, winning her third Karen Rolton Medal (her first as sole winner) for the best player in the women's 1st Grade 50 over competition as well as the Shelley Nitschke Medal for the best player in the 1st Grade T20 competition.

Eliza Doddridge won the Joanne Broadbent Fielding Trophy in the women's 1st Grade competition.

Simon Schwerdt won the award for the best batting aggregate in the men's 3rd Grade competition.

Isabel Durant won the award for the best bowling average in the women's 2nd Grade competition.

Suhas Challa, Ryan Percival and Jay Temme were named in the Team of the Year following the completion of the U18 Shield competition. Suhas and Jay were named as Players of the Carnival, Ryan won the batting trophy, Jay won the bowling trophy and, to complete a clean sweep, Tyson Matthews won the wicketkeeping trophy.

In the new U17 competition, Archah Parisi won the batting trophy, and Jesse Laing and Samarbir Singh shared the bowling trophy.

Following completion of the Cricket Australia U15 Carnival (male), Taite Brook was selected in the Australian squad.

Following completion of the Australian School Sports competition, Indira Panelli was selected in the Australian squad.

In the men's 1st Grade Division 1 competition, the joint winners of the Bradman Medal were Brad Davis (Sturt), Noah McFadyen (Adelaide), Henry Manenti (West Torrens) and Cameron Valente (Port Adelaide), each of whom polled 18 votes. It was the first time that there had been a four-way tie for the Medal. Luke Hollman (Tea Tree Gully) was fifth, with 15 votes. David Grant and Lloyd Pope each polled 12 votes.

In the men's 1st Grade Division 2 competition, the winner of the Sincock Medal was Henry Cullen (Woodville), who polled 20 votes. Michael Cormack (East Torrens) was second, with 18 votes, and Thomas Brown (SACA U19s) was third, with 17 votes. Ryan King (East Torrens) polled the most votes (36) in the count but was ineligible due to suspension.

As I mentioned in my report in last year's annual report, in previous seasons there was an award (the Bradman Medal Team Award) for the club whose players collectively polled the most votes in the Bradman Medal count. With the introduction of the two Divisions in 1st Grade, and the consequential decision to award a separate medal for the best player in Division 2, it was decided that there should be an award (simply called the Team Award) for the team whose players collectively polled the highest number of votes in the Bradman Medal and Sincock Medal counts. This year, the Team Award was won by East Torrens, with 87 votes. Kensington was second, with 74 votes.

Mackenzie Harvey (Sturt) won the Fred Godson Medal, which recognises the best player in the men's 1st Grade West End One Day Cup competition, polling 10 votes. Ten players polled 6 votes each to take equal second place. Josh Doyle polled 4 votes.

Luke Hollman (Tea Tree Gully) and Tom O'Connell (Sturt) were the joint winners of the Darren Lehmann Medal, which recognises the best player in the men's 1st Grade T20 competition, each polling 12 votes. Tom Andrews (Port Adelaide) was third, with 10 votes. Lloyd Pope polled 7 votes.

Isaac Conway (Port Adelaide) won his second successive C W Walker Wicketkeeping Trophy (men's 1st Grade competition), with 168 votes. Will Foley (Woodville) was second, with 158 votes, and Tom van der Jeugd (Tea Tree Gully) was third, with 157 votes. Stephen Doheny polled 120 votes, and Darcy McRostie polled 29 votes.

Sam Kerber (Adelaide University) won his second successive Talbot Smith Fielding Trophy (men's 1st Grade competition), with 34 votes. Jeresses Wadia (Tea Tree Gully) was second, with 32 votes,

and Paul Wasiewicz (Prospect) was third, with 31 votes. Christian Leddiccoat was Kensington's leading vote-winner, with 26 votes.

Stephen Doheny and David Grant were named in the men's Premier Cricket Team of the Year, and Russell Thompson was named coach of the team. The division of the men's 1st Grade competition into two divisions was ignored for the purpose of selecting this team. The players selected in the team were Luke Hollman (Tea Tree Gully), Henry Cullen (Woodville), Ryan King (East Torrens), Brad Davis (Sturt), Thomas Kelly (Sturt) (captain), Thomas Andrews (Port Adelaide), Stephen Doheny (wicketkeeper), Noah McFadyen (Adelaide), Michael McCormack (East Torrens), Aubrey Stockdale (Northern Districts), Tim Oakley (Tea Tree Gully) and David Grant. Russell Thompson was selected as coach of the team.

Shae Daly, Eliza Doddridge and Sarah Lowe were all named in the women's Premier Cricket Team of the Year, with Sarah being named captain of the team. The players selected in that team were Elizabeth Worthley (Sturt) (wicketkeeper), Eliza Doddridge, Jo Gardner (West Torrens), Samantha Betts (Sturt), Chloe Rosenweig (West Torrens), Kate Peterson (Glenelg), Ella Wilson (Glenelg), Sarah Lowe (captain), Keely Stone (Adelaide), Shae Daly, Lucy Bowering (Glenelg) and Matilda Maitland (Sturt). Rhianna Peate (Sturt) was selected as coach of the team.

The Jason Gillespie Medal, the award recognising the men's Grade Cricket Rising Star for the season, was won by Thomas Brown (SACA U19s).

Kyle Adams (three matches) and Ryan Percival (two matches) were selected to play for the SACA U19s in the 1st Grade Division 2 competition.

The LMS and GS Hargrave Trophy, the award recognising the best U23 player in the men's 1st Grade competition, was won by Noah McFadyen (Adelaide).

The winner of the K C Butler Medal (men's 2nd Grade) was Chris Beaty (Adelaide University), with 43 votes. Daanish Mehta (Tea Tree Gully) was second, with 21 votes. Shiv Channa was equal third (with two other players), with 18 votes.

The winner of the Sid Daly Medal (men's 3rd Grade) was Rylan Watt (Tea Tree Gully, with 25 votes. Simon Schwerdt was second, with 23 votes, and Mitchell Cuming (whose club was not recorded) was third, polling 22 votes.

The winner of the McLeod/Wilson Medal (men's 4th Grade) was Josh Greber (Port Adelaide), polling 36 votes. Sid Kumra (East Torrens) was second, with 21 votes, and William Isaksson (whose club was not recorded) was third, with 19 votes. Matt Hopkins was equal fifth (with one other player), polling 18 votes.

As mentioned earlier in my report, Sarah Lowe won her third Karen Rolton Medal, polling 21 votes. Jo Gardner (West Torrens) was second, with 19 votes, and Ella Wilson (Glenelg) was third, with 18 votes. Eliza Doddridge was equal fifth (with two other players), polling 15 votes.

Again as mentioned earlier in my report, Sarah Lowe also won the Shelley Nitschke Medal for the Player of the Series in the women's 1st Grade T20 competition, polling 17 votes. Eliza Doddridge was second, with 12 votes, and Jodie Grewcock (Glenelg) was third, with 11 votes. Alex Price (Sturt) polled the most votes (25) in the count but was ineligible due to suspension.

Elizabeth Worthley (Sturt) won the Marg Jude Wicketkeeping Trophy for the women's 1st Grade competition, polling 186 votes. Kayla McGrath (Glenelg) was second, with 167 votes, and Ilona Melogh (Adelaide) was third, with 122 votes. Teju Jayaprakash was equal fourth (with one other player), with 93 votes. Eliza Doddridge and Bridget Patterson polled 46 and 33 votes respectively.

As mentioned earlier in my report, Eliza Doddridge won the Joanne Broadbent Fielding Trophy for the women's 1st Grade competition. Eliza polled 35 votes. Lucy Bowering (Glenelg) was second, with 28 votes, and Samantha Betts (Sturt) was third, with 23 votes. Zanzibar Menzies was equal

fifth (with two other players), polling 19 votes. Eliza's win was an extraordinary performance, given that she kept wickets in a number of matches.

The winner of the Lyn Fullston Medal for the women's 2nd Grade competition was Jessica Paley (Northern Districts), with 26 votes. Erin Schultz (Sturt) was second, with 23 votes, and Mackenzie Carmichael (Sturt) was third, with 21 votes. Olivia Temme polled 15 votes.

Sturt won its second successive Scrymgour Trophy for the SACA Club Championship, which aggregates the match points for the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grade men's teams for each club. The division of the men's 1st Grade competition into two divisions is ignored for the purpose of calculating points for this trophy. Sturt's points totalled 667.5. Kensington was second, with 635 points, and Tea Tree Gully was third, with 597.5 points.

Adelaide won the Spirit of Cricket Award for senior men's cricket, Kensington won the Spirit of Cricket Award for the women's Grades, and Northern Districts won the Spirit of Cricket Award for the junior Grades.

Glenelg won the President's Trophy, which is awarded annually to the most successful club in the women's Premier Cricket competition.

In previous annual reports, my secretary's report included details relating to the medals awarded in the men's and women's competitions in the season under review. The details for each medal included items such as the name of the medal winner, the highest vote-winner for Kensington, the club with the highest total of votes, Kensington's total votes and the club with the lowest total of votes. Unfortunately, I was unable to provide the same level of information in the last two annual reports, due to the fact that the information provided by SACA to the clubs disclosed much less detail about the awards than had previously been the case. There has been a significant improvement in the information provided this year, with the result that only the details for the awards in men's 3rd and 4th Grades are still somewhat reduced.

In my report in last year's annual report, I recorded the publication of the list of "cap numbers" for players, both men and women, who have played SACA A/1st Grade cricket for the Club. The cap numbers record, in chronological order, the players' A/1st Grade debut for the Club. Both lists appear on the Club's website. The players, who made their debut for the men's 1st Grade team this season, were Stephen Doheny (cap number 441), Jake Lehmann (442), Jason Sangha (443), Seb McVann (444), Wes Agar (445), Will Rice (446) and Shiv Channa (447). The players, who made their debut for the women's 1st Grade team this season, were Natasha McBean (cap number 107), Zanzibar Menzies (108), Abby Collihole (109), Rebecca Stokell (110), Teju Jayaprakash (111), Martha Roberts (112), Jade Gersch (113), Olivia Temme (114) and Elsa Barnfather (115).

Betty Bowley died on 21 June 2024 at the grand age of 97. Betty was the widow of Bruce and the mother of Ian. The Bowley family's association with the Club covers the entire existence of the Club, as Bruce's father Len Bowley (cap number 2) was a member of the Kensington team which entered the SACA A Grade competition in the 1923/24 season. Both Bruce and Ian played for and coached the Club for many years and were named as joint coaches of the Club's Team of the Century last year. Bruce was president of the Club for more than 15 years, and both Bruce and Ian were elected as life members. Betty was a hard worker for, and a wonderful supporter of, the Club throughout both Bruce's and Ian's direct involvement with the Club. She was a great friend to players of all ages, and an important source of help and inspiration not only to players, but also to players' wives and partners. Even after Bruce's death in May 2014, Betty would quite often be seen watching a match being played at Parkinson Oval (perhaps more often from a car in recent years) as she maintained her interest in the Club's teams. Betty's interest in sport was not confined to our Club. She and Bruce (with others) founded the Burnside Hockey Club in 1949, and Betty was the motivating force behind the establishment of the Burnside Women's Hockey Club in 1969. Betty was a life member of the Burnside Hockey Club and of Hockey SA. To all those who knew Betty well, she was the most friendly, delightful and loyal person one could ever have the privilege to meet.

Bob Schramm, father of Daryl, died on 30 July 2024. Bob was a hard-working volunteer for, and enthusiastic supporter of, the Club for many years prior to his move to live in country South Australia. Daryl continues to support the Club in a variety of ways and has recently accepted an invitation to become a Club vice-president.

Lalita Singh, the widow of Prem Singh (secretary of the Club from 1987/88 to 1992/93) and mother of Rajesh and Sanjay Singh (both of whom played for the Club), died on 13 August 2024.

Betty Huntley died on 22 May 2025. Club members, past and present, will remember her as Betty Parkinson, former wife of Club legend David Parkinson, mother of Sam, Liz (Davies), Paul and Tom, and grandmother of Michael and Amy Davies. As was the case with Betty Bowley (it must be synonymous with the name "Betty"), this Betty was also a dedicated supporter of the Club and of her family's involvement with the Club.

In my report in last year's annual report, I mentioned the ongoing difficulties associated with the reporting system known as PlayHQ. While there have been some improvements made to the system this year, it is my view that there is still a long way to go before it is anywhere near being fully acceptable. I still maintain that too much of the time of cricket's volunteers is being devoted to making PlayHQ work as we would like (and expect) it to work. However, I acknowledge that the inclusion of much of the content of this annual report (in particular, the statistics) would be made more difficult and more time-consuming in the absence of the season's records available from PlayHQ. I also acknowledge the contribution which comes from SACA's records etc, and my reliance on information available from SACUSA (the South Australian Cricket Umpires' and Scorers' Association).

In the context of Club records, I am indebted to Jane Lowe for pointing out to me the need to make some changes (corrections and additions) to the list of our women players who have played Test, international and interstate representative cricket. Jane also pointed out, somewhat hesitantly (naturally), the fact that for years I had omitted her name from the list of Club winners of the Fellows Award.

As always, I thank and congratulate all the volunteers who helped the Club in any way this year – your input is indispensable to the continued operation and success of our Club.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the members of Kensington District Cricket Club Inc

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report of the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc., which comprises a Statement of Receipts and Payments for the Cricket Account for the financial year ended 31st May, 2025.

Basis for Qualification

As is common for organizations of this type, it is not practicable for the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc to maintain an effective system of internal control over monies received until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, my audit in relation to receipts was limited to amounts recorded.

Auditor's Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, subject to the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had the limitation discussed in the qualification paragraph not existed, the financial report of the Kensington District Cricket Club Inc presents fairly, in all material respects, the results of the Association's Cricket Account operations for the year ended 31st May, 2025 and the balance of the Cricket Account as at that date.

Basis for opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of my report. I am independent of the entity in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's *APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our my audit of the financial report in Australia. I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

Without modifying my opinion, I draw attention to Note 1 of the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Board's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

Responsibility of the Committee of Management for the Financial Report

The Committee of Management responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* and for such internal control as the Committee members determine is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee members either intend to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Committee of Management is responsible for overseeing the Club's financial reporting process.


Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

I communicate with the Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.
